### Phil. 2:5 ter this mind be in you, which was also in Christ Jesus:

- Phil. 1:3 I thank my God upon every remembrance of you, 4 Always in every prayer of mine for you all making request with joy,
- <u>5</u> For your fellowship in the gospel from the first day until now;
- <u>6</u> Being confident of this very thing, that he which hath begun a good work in you will perform *it* until the day of Jesus Christ:
- <u>7</u> Even as it is meet for me to think this of you all, because I have you in my heart; inasmuch as both in my bonds, and in the defence and confirmation of the gospel, ye all are partakers of my grace.

  - a. An Appropriate Affection, 1:7a "Even as it is meet for me to think this of you all, because I have you in my heart..."

Original Word: φρονέω

Transliteration: phroneó

**Definition:** (a) I think, (b) I think, judge, (c) I direct the mind to, seek for, (d) I observe, (e) I care for.

(Phronéō) essentially equates to personal opinion fleshing itself out in action. This idea is difficult to translate into English because it combines the visceral and cognitive aspects of thinking. (Visceral = from instinct rather than intellect.) http://biblehub.com/greek/5426.htm

b. An Adamant Affection, 1:7b

Phil. 1:7b "...inasmuch as both in my bonds, and in the defence and confirmation of the gospel..."

**Original Word:** ἀπολογία **Transliteration:** apologia

Short Definition: a verbal defense

An apologia is a thought-out response to adequately address the issue(s) that is raised.

An "apology" in classical times had nothing to do with saying, "I'm sorry," but rather was a reasoned argument (defense) that presented evidence (supplied compelling proof).

1 Pet. 3:15 But sanctify the Lord God in your hearts: and be ready always to give an **answer** to every man that asketh you a reason of the hope that is in you with meekness and fear:
