




Thomas Jefferson






John Witherspoon





I. THE AVAILABILITY OF LIBERTY

A. The Prophecy Fulfilled, Isa. 61:1-3, Lu. 4:18-20

Isa. 61:1 The Spirit of the Lord GOD is upon me; because the LORD hath anointed me to preach good tidings unto the meek; he hath sent me to bind up the brokenhearted, to preach liberty to the captives, and the quantum liberty to them that are bound;

Lu. 4:18 The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he hath anointed me to preach the gospel to the poor; he hath sent me to heal the brokenhearted, to preach deliverance to the captives, and recovering of sight to the blind, to se at liberty them that are bruised,

B. The Provisions for Freedom

1. The Preaching

Isa. 61:1b "...the LORD hath anointed me to preach good tidings unto the meek..."

Lu. 4:18b "...he hath anointed me to preach the gospel to the poor..."

2. The Patching

Isa. 61:1c "... he hath sent me to bind up the brokenhearted..."

Lu. 4:18c "...he hath sent me to heal the brokenhearted..."

Original Word: ἰάομαι Transliteration: iaomai

Definition: I heal, generally of the physical, sometimes of spiritual, disease.

iáomai – healing, particularly as supernatural and bringing attention to the Lord Himself as the Great Physician (cf. ls 53:4,5). http://biblehub.com/greek/2390.htm

Original Word: συντρίβω **Transliteration:** suntribó

Definition: Brokenhearted, I break by crushing, break in pieces, shatter, crush, bruise. http://biblehub.com/greek/4937.htm

3. The Proclaiming

Isa. 61:1d "... to proclaim liberty to the captives..."

Lu. 4:18d "...to preach deliverance to the captives..."

Original Word: ἄφεσις

Transliteration: aphesis

Definition: deliverance, a sending away, a letting go, a release, a deliverance, pardon, complete forgiveness.

Lu. 4:18e "...to set at liberty them that are bruised,"


Original Word: ἀποστέλλω **Transliteration:** apostelló

Definition: I send forth, set at liberty, send (as a messenger, commission, etc.), send away, dismiss. http://biblehub.com/greek/649.htm

Original Word: θραύω Transliteration: thrauó

Definition: I bruise, crush, break, shatter; met: I break down.

2352 thraúō – properly, break in pieces (shatter). 2352 (thraúō) is used only in Lk 4:18. http://biblehub.com/greek/2352.htm

Gal. 5:1 Stand fast therefore in the liberty wherewith Christ hath made us free, and be not entangled again with the yoke of bondage. ... 13 For, brethren, ye have been called unto liberty; only use not liberty for an occasion to the flesh, but by love serve one another.

Jas. 1:25 But whoso looketh into the perfect law of liberty, and continue in therein, he being not a forgetful hearer, but a doer of the work, this man shall be blessed in his deed.



Rom. 14:10 But why dost thou judge thy brother? or why dost thou set at nought thy brother? for we shall all stand before the judgment seat of Christ.

11 For it is written, As I live, saill the Lord, every knee shall bow to me, and every tongue shall confess to God.

12 So then every one of us shall give account of himself to God.
