Prov. 30:15-16, 18-19, 21-23, 24-28, 29-31 <u>Prov. 30:15</u> The horseleach hath two daughters, *crying*, Give, give. There are three *things that* are never satisfied, *yea*, four *things* say not, *It is* enough:

<u>16</u> The grave; and the barren womb; the earth *that* is not filled with water; and the fire *that* saith not, *It is* enough. ...

## I. THE FANTASTIC FOUR WITH NO SATISFACTION

<u>Prov. 30:15</u> The horseleach hath two daughters, *crying*, Give, give. There are three *things that* are never satisfied, *yea*, four *things* say not, *It is* enough:

<u>16</u> The grave; and the barren womb; the earth *that* is not filled with water; and the fire *that* saith not, *It is* enough....

When is enough, enough?

1. <u>FINALITY</u> – "The grave; ..." – Life is perpetually ending AND the grave is never satisfied with "enough."

Jas. 4:14 Whereas ye know not what *shall be* on the morrow. For what *is* your life? It is even a vapour, that appeareth for a little time, and then vanisheth away.

Job 14:1 Man *that is* born of a woman *is* of few days, and full of trouble.

 <u>FAMILY</u> – "...the barren womb..." Lineage is languishing AND the future family heritage is jeopardized.

<u>Psa. 127:3</u> Lo, children *are* an heritage of the LORD: *and* the fruit of the womb *is his* reward. 3. <u>FILLING</u> – "...the earth *that* is not filled with water..." – Lust is never quenched AND like the earth, never has "enough."

<u>2 Tim. 2:22</u> Flee also youthful lusts: but follow righteousness, faith, charity, peace, with them that call on the Lord out of a pure heart.

<u>1 Pet. 2:11</u> Dearly beloved, I beseech *you* as strangers and pilgrims, abstain from fleshly lusts, which war against the soul;

Gal. 5:16 This I say then, Walk in the Spirit, and ye shall not fulfil the lust of the flesh.

4. <u>FIRE</u> – "...the fire..." Loss by fire consumes, continually, AND is never satisfied.

<u>Prov. 26:20</u> Where no wood is, there the fire goeth out: so where there is no talebearer, the strife ceaseth. <u>21</u> As coals are to burning coals, and wood to fire; so is a contentious man to kindle strife.

<u>Summary</u>

•Life is perpetually ending AND the grave is never satisfied with "enough."

Lineage is languishing AND the future family heritage is jeopardized.

•Lust is never quenched AND like the earth, never has "enough."

 Loss by fire consumes, AND continually, is never satisfied.

1. <u>UNQUALIFIED</u> – "For a servant when he reigneth..." – Chaos results when the unqualified gain authority.

2. <u>UNAPPRECIATIVE</u> – "...a fool when he is filled with meat..."
– Callousness results when the unsympathetic are content.

3. <u>UNPLEASANT</u> – "For an odious *woman* when she is married..." – Clamorous atmosphere abounds with the presence of hateful malcontents.

4. <u>UNGRACIOUS</u> – "...an handmaid that is heir to her mistress." – Contemptuous arrogance generates discord.

•Chaos results when the unqualified gain authority.
