The Greek word for feeble is asthenés: it is also translated weak (12x), sick (6x), weakness (2x), weaker (1x), weak things (1x), impotent (1x), more feeble (1x), without strength(1x).

Original Word: ἀσθενής

Transliteration: asthenés

Definition: (lit: not strong), (a) weak (physically, or morally),

(b) infirm, sick.

How to behave with disabled people: A new guide tells you what to do and what not to do

- Sixty-seven per cent of British people feel so awkward around disabled people they either panic or avoid all contact with us.
- Forty-eight per cent have never started a conversation with a disabled person.
- Seventy-six per cent have never invited a disabled person to a social occasion and only 16 per cent have invited one of us into their homes.
- Saddest of all, only five per cent of people who are not disabled have ever asked out, or been on a date with, someone who is.

I. THE OBVIOUS CHALLENGE

A. The Awkwardness

"The big message," Alex Brooker says, "is to treat people as people. Deal with who they are. Don't feel bad. It's human nature to be awkward. Just see that you're talking to a person. It doesn't matter what they've got up with them, you're still talking to a person. Don't let awkwardness consume you, because if it goes on too long it just becomes weird. And you don't want to be the weirdo in the office."

What not to do:

- * Don't be afraid to talk to us. We're just people.
- * But don't feel you have to talk to every disabled person you see to prove you're not awkward around us.
- * Don't be afraid to ask a question about our disabilities. But don't just talk about our disabilities. There is much more to us.
- * Don't assume physical impairment also means mental impairment (or vice versa).

- * Don't talk to us loudly and slowly unless we tell you we have hearing problems.
- * Never touch a disabled person's wheelchair or disability aids without permission: they're extensions of our bodies.
- * If you feel truly awkward, don't be afraid to admit it. We'll probably laugh with you. The pretence that things aren't awkward only makes them worse.
- * If you have a bad experience talking to one disabled person, don't let it put you off talking to others. You wouldn't stop talking to all ablebodied people just because you once had an awkward conversation with one.
- Don't worry too much. However awkward a situation is, we've probably been in worse.

B. The Awareness

Mt. 25:39 Or when saw we thee sick, or in prison, and came unto thee?

40 And the King shall answer and say unto them, Verily I say unto you, Inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of the least of these my brethren, ye have done it unto me. ...

43 I was a stranger, and ye took me not in: naked, and ye clothed me not: **sick**, and in prison, and ye visited me not.

45 Then shall he answer them, saying, Verily I say unto you, Inasmuch as ye did it not to one of the least of these, ye did it not to me.

II. THE OBLIVIOUS COMPREHENSION

<u>Isa. 11:2</u> And the spirit of the LORD shall rest upon him, the spirit of wisdom and understanding, the spirit of counsel and might, the spirit of knowledge and of the fear of the LORD; <u>3</u> And shall make him of quick understanding in the fear of the LORD: and <u>he shall not judge after the sight of his eyes</u>, neither reprove after the hearing of his ears:

A. The Apprehension as a Deterrent

<u>Apprehension</u> = anticipation of adversity or misfortune; suspicion or fear of future trouble or evil.

III. THE OPPORTUNITY TO COMFORT

1 Thess. 5:14 Now we exhort you, brethren, warn them that are unruly, comfort the feebleminded, support the weak, be patient toward all *men*.

A. Our Past Calamity

Psa. 38:8 I am feeble and sore broken: I have roared by reason of the disquietness of my heart.

Rom. 5:6 For when we were yet without strength, in due time Christ died for the ungodly.

8 But God commendeth his love toward us, in that, while we were yet sinners, Christ died for us.

B. Our Present Commitment

1 Thess. 5:14 "...the feebleminded, support the weak..."

Mt. 26:41 Watch and pray, that ye enter not into temptation: the spirit indeed is willing, but the flesh is weak.

Acts 20:35 I have shewed you all things, how that so labouring ye ought to support the weak, and to remember the words of the Lord Jesus, how he said, It is more blessed to give than to receive.

Rom .15:1 We then that are strong ought to bear the infirmities of the weak, and not to please ourselves.

<u>Psa. 117:2</u> For his merciful kindness is great toward us: and the truth of the LORD *endureth* for ever. Praise ye the LORD.

1 Cor. 13:4 Charity suffereth long, and is kind; charity envieth not; charity vaunteth not itself, is not puffed up,

Eph. 4:32 And be ye kind one to another, tenderhearted, forgiving one another, even as God for Christ's sake hath forgiven you.

<u>2 Pet. 1:7</u> And to godliness brotherly kindness; and to brotherly kindness charity.

Conclusion

- 6 Which he shed on us abundantly through Jesus Christ our Saviour;
- 7 That being justified by his grace, we should be made heirs according to the hope of eternal life.
- <u>8</u> This is a faithful saying, and these things I will that thou affirm constantly, that they which have believed in God might be careful to maintain good works. These things are good and profitable unto men.
