Lu. 12:18 And he said, This will I do: I will pull down my barns, and build greater; and there will I bestow all my fruits and my goods. 19 And I will say to my soul, Soul, thou hast much goods laid up for many years; take thine ease, eat, drink, *and* be merry. 20 But God said unto him, *Thou* fool, this night thy soul shall be required of thee: then whose shall those things be, which thou hast provided?

Jn. 15:5 I am the vine, ye *are* the branches: He that abideth in me, and I in him, the same bringeth forth much fruit: for **without me ye** can do nothing.



b. Our human frailty, 4:14b "...For what *is* your life? It is even a vapour, that appeareth for a little time, and then vanisheth away."

The grand illusion of life is that an eternal soul will maintain a temporal existence infinitum. The reality of life is the temporality of it.

<u>Job 7:6</u> My days are swifter than a weaver's shuttle, and are spent without hope.

<u>Job 8:9</u> (For we *are but of* yesterday, and know nothing, because our days upon earth *are* a shadow:)

Job 9:26 They are passed away as the swift ships: as the eagle *that* hasteth to the prey.



Job 14:2 He cometh forth like a flower, and is cut down: he fleeth also as a shadow, and continueth not.

Jas. 4:14b "...For what is your life? It is even a vapour, that appeareth for a little time, and then vanisheth away."

<u>The Entrance</u> – "...life...a vapour...that appeareth..." = we have a nebulous entity that has a beginning.

<u>The Existence</u> – "...for a little time..." = in the grand scheme of things, we have a temporal, chronological period of existence, bounded by the infinity of eternity.

<u>The Expiration</u> – "...then vanisheth away." = the temporal existence of insignificance fades into the nothingness of history.

1 Cor. 10:31 Whether therefore ye eat, or drink, or whatsoever ye do, do all to the glory of God.

# 3. The proposition, 4:15

<u>Jas. 4:15</u> For that ye *ought* to say, If the Lord will, we shall live, and do this, or that.

Acts 18:21 But bade them farewell, saying, I must by all means keep this feast that cometh in Jerusalem: but I will return again unto you, if God will. And he sailed from Ephesus.

1 Cor. 4:19 But I will come to you shortly, if the Lord will, and will know, not the speech of them which are puffed up, but the power.

1 Cor. 16:7 For I will not see you now by the way; but I trust to tarry a while with you, if the Lord permit.



### 4. The prohibition, 4:16

Jas. 4:16 But now ye rejoice in your boastings: all such rejoicing is evil.

In these verses, James presented four arguments that show the foolishness of ignoring God's will:

- the complexity of life (v. 13)
- the uncertainty of life (v. 14a)
- the brevity of life (v. 14b)
- the frailty of man (v. 16).
  - 5. The principle, 4:17

Jas. 4:17 Therefore to him that knoweth to do good, and doeth *it* not, to him it is sin.

# **Conclusion**

<u>Jas. 1:27</u> Pure religion and undefiled before God and the Father is this, To visit the fatherless and widows in their affliction, *and* to keep himself unspotted from the world.

<u>Jas. 2:26</u> For as the body without the spirit is dead, so faith without works is dead also.

Jas. 3:18 And the fruit of righteousness is sown in peace of them that make peace.

Jas. 4:17 Therefore to him that knoweth to do good, and doeth *it* not, to him it is sin.
