V. THE QUESTION OF SUBMISSION, 2:13-3:13

- A. Our formal obligations, 2:13-25
 - 1. Submit as subjects, 2:13-17
 - a. The exhortation, 2:13a-b
 - (1) Submission to human laws, 2:13a "Submit yourselves to every ordinance of man..."
- Rom. 13:1 Let every soul be subject unto the higher powers. For there is no power but of God: the powers that be are ordained of God.
- 2 Whosoever therefore resisteth the power, resisteth the ordinance of God: and they that resist shall receive to themselves damnation.
- 3 For rulers are not a terror to good works, but to the evil. Wilt thou then not be afraid of the power? do that which is good, and thou shalt have praise of the same:
- 4 For he is the minister of God to thee for good. But if thou do that which is evil, be afraid; for he beareth not the sword in vain: for he is the minister of God, a revenger to *execute* wrath upon him that doeth evil.

- 5 Wherefore *ye* must needs be subject, not only for wrath, but also for conscience sake.
- 6 For this cause pay ye tribute also: for they are God's ministers, attending continually upon this very thing.
- 7 Render therefore to all their dues: tribute to whom tribute *is due*; custom to whom custom; fear to whom fear; honour to whom honour.
- 1 Tim. 2:1 I exhort therefore, that, first of all, supplications, prayers, intercessions, and giving of thanks, be made for all men;
- 2 For kings, and for all that are in authority; that we may lead a quiet and peaceable life in all godliness and honesty.

<u>Titus 3:1</u> Put them in mind to be subject to principalities and powers, to obey magistrates, to be ready to every good work, 2 To speak evil of no man, to be no brawlers, but gentle, shewing all meekness unto all men.

Original Word: ὑποτάσσω Transliteration: hupotassó

Definition: I place under, subject to; mid, pass: I submit, put myself into subjection.

Original Word: πᾶς, πᾶσα, πᾶν

Transliteration: pas

Definition: all, the whole, every kind of.

pás ("each, every") means "all" in the sense of "each (every) part that applies." The emphasis of the total picture then is on "one piece at a time." http://biblehub.com/greek/3956.htm

Original Word: κτίσις Transliteration: ktisis

- (2) Submission to heaven's Lord, 2:13b "...for the Lord's sake..."
- b. The extent, 2:13c-14
 - (1) The supreme governing authorities, 2:13c "...whether it be to the king, as supreme; "
 - (2) The subordinate governing authorities, 2:14
 - (3) Governors and their delegated authority, 2:14a "Or unto governors..."

Mt. 27:2 And when they had bound him, they led him away, and delivered him to Pontius Pilate the governor.

Acts 23:24 And provide them beasts, that they may set Paul on, and bring him safe unto Felix the governor.

- (4) Governors and their dual activity, 2:14b-c
 - (a) To punish, 2:14b "...as unto them that are sent by him for the punishment of evildoers..."
 - (b) To praise, 2:14c "..., and for the praise of them that do well."
- c. The explanation, 2:15-17
 - (1) In terms of our Lord, 2:15
 - (a) Because of the will of God, 2:15a "For so is the will of God..."

- Mt. 17:24 And when they were come to Capernaum, they that received tribute *money* came to Peter, and said, Doth not your master pay tribute?
- 25 He saith, Yes. And when he was come into the house, Jesus prevented him, saying, What thinkest thou, Simon? of whom do the kings of the earth take custom or tribute? of their own children, or of strangers?
- 26 Peter saith unto him, Of strangers. Jesus saith unto him, Then are the children free.
- 27 Notwithstanding, lest we should offend them, go thou to the sea, and cast an hook, and take up the fish that first cometh up; and when thou hast opened his mouth, thou shalt find a piece of money: that take, and give unto them for me and thee.

- (2) In terms of our liberty, 2:16
 - (a) A liberty not to be abused by license, 2:16a "As free, and not using *your* liberty for a cloke of maliciousness..."
 - (b) A liberty not to be abused by laziness, 2:16b "...but as the servants of God."
- Mt. 26:52 Then said Jesus unto him, Put up again thy sword into his place: for all they that take the sword shall perish with the sword.

 53 Thinkest thou that I cannot now pray to my Father, and he shall presently give me more than twelve legions of angels?

 54 But how then shall the scriptures be fulfilled, that thus it must be?

- (3) In terms of our locality, 2:17
 - (a) We must regard those around us 2:17a-b
 - i. Our fellows, 2:17a "Honour all men..."

Luke 6:27 But I say unto you which hear, Love your enemies, do good to them which hate you, 35 But love ye your enemies, and do good, and lend, hoping for nothing again; and your reward shall be great, and ye shall be the children of the Highest: for he is kind unto the unthankful and to the evil.

Rom. 12:10 Be kindly affectioned one to another with brotherly love; in honour preferring one another;

ii. Our fellowship, 2:17b "...Love the brotherhood..."

Jn. 13:34 A new commandment I give unto you, That ye love one another; as I have loved you, that ye also love one another.

35 By this shall all men know that ye are my disciples, if ye have love one to another.

Jn. 15:12 This is my commandment, That ye love one another, as I have loved you.

Rom. 13:8 Owe no man any thing, but to love one another: for he that loveth another hath fulfilled the law.

1 Jn. 4:11 Beloved, if God so loved us, we ought also to love one another.

- (b) We must regard those above us, 2:17c-d
 - i. The One on the heavenly throne, 2:17c "...Fear God..."

Prov. 1:7 The fear of the LORD is the beginning of knowledge: but fools despise wisdom and instruction.

Prov. 9:10 The fear of the LORD is the beginning of wisdom: and the knowledge of the holy is understanding.

ii. The one on the human throne, 2:17d "...Honour the king."

Prov. 16:10 A divine sentence is in the lips of the king: his mouth transgresseth not in judgment.
