- Fourth, submission includes doing what is right (3:6). It does not include violating other Scriptural principles. Submission is imperative for oneness in marriage.[156]

Transliteration: hagnos

Definition: (originally, in a condition prepared for worship), pure (either ethically, or ritually, ceremonially), chaste.

Original Word: τιμή
Transliteration: timé
Definition: a price, honor.

timé (from tiō, "accord honor, pay respect") – properly, perceived value; worth (literally, "price") especially as perceived honor – i.e. what has value in the eyes of the beholder; (figuratively) the value (weight, honor) willingly assigned to something. http://biblehub.com/greek/5092.htm

Conclusion

- 1 Tim. 2:8 I will therefore that men pray every where, lifting up holy hands, without wrath and doubting.
