First Peter 1 Pet. 5:8-14

- 1 Pet. 5:8 Be sober, be vigilant; because your adversary the devil, as a roaring lion, walketh about, seeking whom he may devour:
- 9 Whom resist stedfast in the faith, knowing that the same afflictions are accomplished in your brethren that are in the world.
- 10 But the God of all grace, who hath called us unto his eternal glory by Christ Jesus, after that ye have suffered a while, make you perfect, stablish, strengthen, settle *you*.
- 11 To him be glory and dominion for ever and ever. Amen.
- 12 By Silvanus, a faithful brother unto you, as I suppose, I have written briefly, exhorting, and testifying that this is the true grace of God wherein ye stand.
- 13 The church that is at Babylon, elected together with you, saluteth you; and so doth Marcus my son.
- 14 Greet ye one another with a kiss of charity. Peace be with you all that are in Christ Jesus. Amen.

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VIII. THE QUESTION OF SATAN, 5:8-11

- A. Watching for the roaring lion, 5:8
 - 1. The requirements, 5:8a-b
 - a. Be victorious, 5:8a "Be sober..."
- Mt. 26:41 Watch and pray, that ye enter not into temptation: the spirit indeed *is* willing, but the flesh *is* weak.
- 1 Cor. 16:13 Watch ye, stand fast in the faith, quit you like men, be strong.
- Jas. 1:13 Let no man say when he is tempted, I am tempted of God: for God cannot be tempted with evil, neither tempteth he any man:

2 Cor. 11:3 But I fear, lest by any means, as the serpent beguiled Eve through his subtilty, so your minds should be corrupted from the simplicity that is in Christ.

Original Word: νήφω

Transliteration: néphó

Definition: (lit: I am sober), I am calm (vigilant), circumspect.

néphō – properly, to be sober (not drunk), not intoxicated; (figuratively) free from illusion, i.e. from the intoxicating influences of sin (like the impact of selfish passion, greed, etc.).

néphō ("be sober, unintoxicated") refers to having presence of mind (clear judgment), enabling someone to be temperate (self-controlled). néphō ("uninfluenced by intoxicants") means to have "one's wits (faculties) about them," which is the opposite of being irrational. http://biblehub.com/greek/3525.htm

b. Be vigilant, 5:8b "...be vigilant..."

Original Word: γρηγορέω

Transliteration: grégoreó

Definition: (a) I am awake (in the night), watch, (b) I am watchful, on the alert, vigilant.

grēgoreúō – literally, "stay awake"; (figuratively) be *vigilant* (*responsible*, watchful).

- 2. The reason, 5:8c-d
 - a. Because the enemy is powerful, 5:8c "...because your adversary the devil, as a roaring lion ..."

1 Tim. 5:14 I will therefore that the younger women marry, bear children, guide the house, give none occasion to **the adversary** to speak reproachfully.

15 For some are already turned aside after Satan.

Psa. 104:21 The young lions roar after their prey, and seek their meat from God.

<u>Isa. 5:29</u> Their roaring *shall be* like a lion, they shall roar like young lions: yea, they shall roar, and lay hold of the prey, and shall carry *it* away safe, and none shall deliver *it*.

Amos 3:4 Will a lion roar in the forest, when he hath no prey? will a young lion cry out of his den, if he have taken nothing?

8 The lion hath roared, who will not fear? the Lord GOD hath spoken, who can but prophesy?

- b. Because the enemy is prowling, 5:8d "...walketh about, seeking whom he may devour:"
- Job 1:7 And the LORD said unto Satan, Whence comest thou? Then Satan answered the LORD, and said, From going to and from the earth, and from walking up and down in it. (Job 2:2)

Original Word: καταπίνω

Transliteration: katapinó

Definition: I drink down, swallow, devour, destroy, consume http://biblehub.com/greek/2666.htm

1 Cor. 15:54 So when this corruptible shall have put on incorruption, and this mortal shall have put on immortality, then shall be brought to pass the saying that is written, Death is swallowed up in victory.

Heb. 11:29 By faith they passed through the Red sea as by dry land: which the Egyptians assaying to do were drowned.

- B. Warring with the roaring lion, 5:9
 - 1. Unyielding resistance, 5:9a "Whom resist stedfast in the faith..."

Original Word: ἀνθίστημι Transliteration: anthistémi

Short Definition: I take a stand against, oppose, resist

Properly, take a complete stand against, i.e. a "180 degree, contrary position"; (figuratively) to establish one's position publicly by conspicuously "holding one's ground," i.e. refusing to be moved ("pushed back").

anthístēmi ("oppose fully") means to forcefully declare one's personal conviction (where they unswervingly stand); to keep one's possession; ardently withstand, without giving up (letting go).

(anthístēmi) was a military term in classical Greek (used by Thucydides, etc.) meaning "to strongly resist an opponent" ("take a firm stand against") http://biblehub.com/greek/436.htm

- Eph. 6:11 Put on the whole armour of God, that ye may be able to stand against the wiles of the devil.
- 12 For we wrestle not against flesh and blood, but against principalities, against powers, against the rulers of the darkness of this world, against spiritual wickedness in high places.
- 13 Wherefore take unto you the whole armour of God, that ye may be able to withstand in the evil day, and having done all, to stand.

Jas. 4:7 Submit yourselves therefore to God. Resist the devil, and he will flee from you.

THE CHRISTIAN'S THREE-FOLD ENEMY

<u>Problem</u>	Solution
The World (1 John 2:15-17) Lust of the flesh Lust of the eyes Pride of life	Flee (1 Tim. 6:11; 2 Tim. 2:22)
The flesh	Deny
(Rom. 7:18-24)	(Rom. 6:12-13; 8:13)
The devil	Resist
(1 Peter 5:8)	(1 Peter 5:9)

Peter advocated three responses to Satan in this passage:

- First, we should respect him ("be sober," v. 8).
- Second, Peter said we should recognize Satan ("be vigilant," v. 8).
- Third, we should resist Satan (v. 9).
- 1 Tim. 6:11 But thou, O man of God, flee these things; and follow after righteousness, godliness, faith, love, patience, meekness.
- 2 Tim. 2:22 Flee also youthful lusts: but follow righteousness, faith, charity, peace, with them that call on the Lord out of a pure heart.

- Rom. 6:12 Let not sin therefore reign in your mortal body, that ye should obey it in the lusts thereof.
- 13 Neither yield ye your members as instruments of unrighteousness unto sin: but yield yourselves unto God, as those that are alive from the dead, and your members as instruments of righteousness unto God.

Rom 8:13 For if ye live after the flesh, ye shall die: but if ye through the Spirit do mortify the deeds of the body, ye shall live.

2. United resistance, 5:9b "...knowing that the same afflictions are accomplished in your brethren that are in the world."

1 Cor. 10:13 There hath no temptation taken you but such as is common to man: but God *is* faithful, who will not suffer you to be tempted above that ye are able; but will with the temptation also make a way to escape, that ye may be able to bear *it*.

We need to SEEK the "way to escape" and then...
TAKE the "way to escape."

- C. Winning over the roaring lion, 5:10-11
 - 1. God and His grace, 5:10a "But the God of all grace, who hath called us unto his eternal glory by Christ Jesus ..."
- 2 Cor. 12:9 And he said unto me, My grace is sufficient for thee: for my strength is made perfect in weakness. Most gladly therefore will I rather glory in my infirmities, that the power of Christ may rest upon me.

- 2. God and His goal, 5:10b-c
 - a. The process, 5:10b "...after that ye have suffered a while..."
- 2 Tim. 3:12 Yea, and all that will live godly in Christ Jesus shall suffer persecution.
 - b. The prospect, 5:10c "...make you perfect, stablish, strengthen, settle you."

Original Word: καταρτίζω Transliteration: katartizó

Definition: (a) I fit (join) together; met: I compact together, (b) act. and mid: I prepare, perfect, for his (its) full destination or use, bring into its proper condition (whether for the first time, or after a lapse).

katartízō (from katá, "according to, down," intensifying artizō, "to adjust," which is derived from ártios, "properly adjusted") – properly, exactly fit (adjust) to be in good working order, i.e. adjusted exactly "down" to fully function.

1 Cor. 1:10 Now I beseech you, brethren, by the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, that ye all speak the same thing, and *that* there be no divisions among you; but *that* ye be perfectly joined together in the same mind and in the same judgment.

Gal. 6:1 Brethren, if a man be overtaken in a fault, ye which are spiritual, restore such an one in the spirit of meekness; considering thyself, lest thou also be tempted.

1 Thess. 3:10 Night and day praying exceedingly that we might see your face, and might perfect that which is lacking in your faith?

Heb. 11:3 Through faith we understand that the worlds were framed by the word of God, so that things which are seen were not made of things which do appear.

Heb. 13:21 Make you perfect in every good work to do his will, working in you that which is wellpleasing in his sight, through Jesus Christ; to whom *be* glory for ever and ever. Amen.

Rom. 8:28 And we know that all things work together for good to them that love God, to them who are the called according to *his* purpose.

Original Word: στηρίζω

Transliteration: stérizó

Definition: (a) I fix firmly, direct myself towards, (b) generally met: I buttress, prop, support; I strengthen, establish.

stērízō (from stēringks, "a support that fixes, plants down"; akin to hístēmi, "to stand," having a duplication of the primitive Gk root/sta, "to make stand") – properly, set fast (fix); give support to secure (firmly establish); solidly plant (which eliminates vacillation). http://biblehub.com/greek/4741.htm

- 1 Thess. 3:2 And sent Timotheus, our brother, and minister of God, and our fellowlabourer in the gospel of Christ, to establish you, and to comfort you concerning your faith:
- 2 Thess. 2:17 Comfort your hearts, and stablish you in every good word and work.

Jas. 5:8 Be ye also patient; stablish your hearts: for the coming of the Lord draweth nigh.

Original Word: σθενόω Transliteration: sthenoó Definition: I strengthen.

Sthenóō (from sthenos, "strength") – properly, make strong so as to be mobile – i.e. able to move in a way that achieves something in the most effective way. http://biblehub.com/greek/4599.htm

Original Word: θεμελιόω Transliteration: themelioó

Short Definition: I found, lay the foundation http://biblehub.com/greek/2311.htm

Luke 6:48 He is like a man which built an house, and digged deep, and laid the foundation on a rock: and when the flood arose, the stream beat vehemently upon that house, and could not shake it: for it was founded upon a rock.

Eph. 3:17 That Christ may dwell in your hearts by faith; that ye, being rooted and grounded in love,

Col. 1:23 If ye continue in the faith grounded and settled, and be not moved away from the hope of the gospel, which ye have heard, and which was preached to every creature which is under heaven; whereof I Paul am made a minister;

3. God and His glory, 5:11

a. It is personal glory, 5:11a "To him be glory..."

We are to focus our earthly challenges in view of the Lord's eternal glory!

b. It is positional glory, 5:11b "...and dominion..."

c. It is perpetual glory, 5:11c "...for ever and ever. Amen."

Conclusion

Mt. 4:21 And going on from thence, he saw other two brethren, James *the son* of Zebedee, and John his brother, in a ship with Zebedee their father, mending their nets; and he called them.

Luke 22:32 But I have prayed for thee, that thy faith fail not: and when thou art converted, strengthen thy brethren.

Though Peter messed up, he repented and then, faithfully followed the Lord the rest of his life!

1 Jn. 4:4 Ye are of God, little children, and have overcome them: because greater is he that is in you, than he that is in the world.
