i. You will not fall now, 1:10b "...for if ye do these things, ye shall never fall:"

<u>1 Cor. 10:12</u> Wherefore let him that thinketh he standeth take heed lest he fall.

<u>Jude 1:24</u> Now unto him that is able to keep you from falling, and to present *you* faultless before the presence of his glory with exceeding joy,

Jn. 5:24 Verily, verily, I say unto you, He that heareth my word, and believeth on him that sent me, hath everlasting life, and shall not come into condemnation; but is passed from death unto life. Rom. 5:1 Therefore being justified by faith, we have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ:

<u>Rom. 8:38</u> For I am persuaded, that neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor principalities, nor powers, nor things present, nor things to come,

epichorégeó: to supply Original Word: ἐπιχορηγέω Transliteration: epichorégeó Definition: I supply, provide (perhaps lavishly), furnish.

epixorēgéō (from *epí*, "appropriately *on*," which intensifies *xorēgeō*, "richly *supply* everything needed for an ancient *chorus* to be a *grand* production") – properly, *lavishly* supply, as it is suitable (apt) to outfit all that is needed to accomplish a *grand* objective. http://biblehub.com/greek/2023.htm <u>2 Pet. 1:5</u> And beside this, giving all diligence, add to your faith virtue; and to virtue knowledge;

<u>1 Cor. 3:15</u> If any man's work shall be burned, he shall suffer loss: but he himself shall be saved; yet so as by fire.

<u>1 Pet. 1:3</u> Blessed *be* the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, which according to his abundant mercy **hath begotten us again unto a lively hope by the resurrection of Jesus Christ** from the dead, <u>4</u> To an inheritance incorruptible, and undefiled, and that fadeth not away, reserved in heaven for you, <u>5</u> Who are kept by the power of God through faith unto salvation ready to be revealed in the last time. (2) The need for his exhortation, 1:12

(a) Peter's responsibility, 1:12a "Wherefore I will not be negligent to put you always in remembrance of these things..."

(b) Peter's realization, 1:12b "...though ye know them, and be established in the present truth."

stérizó: to make fast, establish Original Word: στηρίζω Transliteration: stérizó Definition: (a) I fix firmly, direct myself towards, (b) generally met: I buttress, prop, support; I strengthen, establish.

stērízō (from *stēringks*, "a support that fixes, plants down"; akin to *hístēmi*, "to stand," having a duplication of the primitive Gk root/*sta*, "to make stand") – properly, set fast (fix); give *support to secure* (firmly establish); solidly plant (which eliminates vacillation). <u>http://biblehub.com/greek/4741.htm</u>

Luke 9:51 And it came to pass, when the time was come that he should be received up, he stedfastly set his face to go to Jerusalem,

(1) His unfaltering determination, 1:13

<u>2 Pet. 1:13</u> Yea, I think it meet, as long as I am in this tabernacle, to stir you up by putting *you* in remembrance;

hégeomai: to lead, suppose, think, account Original Word: ἡγέομαι Transliteration: hégeomai Phonetic Spelling: (hayg-eh'-om-ahee) Definition: (a) I lead, (b) I think, am of opinion, suppose, consider.

hēgéomai (from *ágō*, "to lead") – properly, to lead the way (going before as a *chief*) – cognate with *hēgemṓn* ("a governor or official who leads others").

hēgéomai ("what goes before, in front") refers to *coming first in priority* such as: "the leading thought" in one's mind, i.e. to esteem (regard highly); or a leading authority, providing leadership in a local church (see Heb. 13:7,17,24 = "rule").

hēgéomai ("an official who *leads*") carries important responsibility and hence "casts a heavy vote" (influence) – and hence deserve cooperation by those who are led (Heb 13:7; passive, "to esteem/reckon heavily" the person or influence who is leading).] http://biblehub.com/greek/2233.htm skénóma: a tent Original Word: σκήνωμα Transliteration: skénóma Definition: a tent pitched, a dwelling, tabernacle.

skénōma – properly, a pitched tent ("tabernacle," Ac 7:46); (figuratively) the physical body, serving as God's vehicle (dwelling place) – i.e. as believers live as sojourner-travelers ("pilgrims") with the Lord in this life, through faith (2 Pet 1:13,14). <u>http://biblehub.com/greek/4638.htm</u>
