1. Its integrity, 1:16a "For we have not followed cunningly devised fables..."

Original Word: μῦθος Transliteration: muthos Definition: an idle tale, fable, fanciful story.

mýthos – a myth; a false account, yet posing to be the truth; a *fabrication* (fable) which subverts (replaces) what is actually true. <u>http://biblehub.com/greek/3454.htm</u>

<u>2 Pet. 3:3</u> Knowing this first, that there shall come in the last days scoffers, walking after their own lusts,

2. Its instruction, 1:16b-18

a. The heavenly vision, 1:16b "...when we made known unto you the power and coming of our Lord Jesus Christ, but were eyewitnesses of his majesty."

<u>2 Pet. 1:16</u> For we have not followed cunningly devised fables, when we made known unto you the power and **coming** of our Lord Jesus Christ, but were eyewitnesses of his majesty.

<u>Mt. 16:28</u> Verily I say unto you, There be some standing here, which shall not taste of death, till they see the Son of man coming in his kingdom.

b. The heraldic voice, 1:17-18

(1) Its testimony conveyed, 1:17

<u>2 Pet. 2:17</u> For he received from God the Father honour and glory, when there came such a voice to him from the excellent glory, This is my beloved Son, in whom I am well pleased.

<u>1 J. 5:1</u> Whosoever believeth that Jesus is the Christ is born of God: and every one that loveth him that begat loveth him also that is begotten of him.
<u>2</u> By this we know that we love the children of God, when we love God, and keep his commandments.
<u>3</u> For this is the love of God, that we keep his

commandments: and his commandments are not grievous.

(2) Its testimony confirmed, 1:18

<u>2 Pet. 2:18</u> And this voice which came from heaven we heard, when we were with him in the holy mount.

<u>Mt. 17:5</u> While he yet spake, behold, a bright cloud overshadowed them: and behold a voice out of the cloud, which said, This is my beloved Son, in whom I am well pleased; hear ye him.

Mark 9:7 And there was a cloud that overshadowed them: and a voice came out of the cloud, saying, This is my beloved Son: hear him.

Luke 9:35 And there came a voice out of the cloud, saying, This is my beloved Son: hear him.

3. Its incomparability, 1:19a "We have also a more sure word of prophecy; whereunto ye do well that ye take heed..."

Original Word: βέβαιος Transliteration: bebaios Definition: firm, steadfast, enduring, sure, certain.

bébaios (an adjective, derived from *bainō*, "to walk where it is solid") – properly, solid (sure) enough to walk on; hence, *firm*, *unshakable*; (figuratively) *absolutely dependable*, giving *guaranteed support* (security, surety).

bébaios (literally, "what can be tread upon") then refers to what is fully dependable, i.e. worthy of confidence because on "*solid footing*." This describes what is fully *secure* (stable), and therefore can be trusted to give *full support*. <u>http://biblehub.com/greek/949.htm</u> Psa. 119:9 Wherewithal shall a young man cleanse his way? by taking heed *thereto* according to thy word.

4. Its illumination, 1:19b "...as unto a light that shineth in a dark place, until the day dawn, and the day star arise in your hearts:"

Mt. 17:2 And was transfigured before them: and his face did shine as the sun, and his raiment was white as the light.

<u>Rev. 22:16</u> I Jesus have sent mine angel to testify unto you these things in the churches. I am the root and the offspring of David, and the bright and morning star.

5. Its inspiration, 1:20-21

<u>2 Pet. 1:20</u> Knowing this first, that no prophecy of the scripture is of any private interpretation.
<u>21</u> For the prophecy came not in old time by the will of man: but holy men of God spake *as they were* moved by the Holy Ghost.

Original Word: ἴδιος Transliteration: idios Definition: one's own, belonging to one, private, personal; one's own people, one's own family, home, property.

ídios (a primitive word, *NAS dictionary*) – properly, *uniquely one's own*, *peculiar* to the *individual*. *ídios* ("uniquely one's own") is "stronger than the simple possessive pronoun ('own'). This emphatic adjective means '*private*, *personal* " <u>http://biblehub.com/greek/2398.htm</u> Original Word: ἐπίλυσις Transliteration: epilusis Phonetic Spelling: (ep-il'-oo-sis) Definition: solution, explanation, interpretation; release.

epílysis (from *epí*, "*on*, fitting" and, "to loose") – properly, unloosing (unpacking) in an *apt* (*appropriate*) manner, i.e. that builds on sound hermeneutical principles (note the *epi*, "upon").

epílysis ("sound *interpretation*") only occurs in 2 Pet 1:20 and refers to "untying interpretation knots" to discern the *true meaning* of future Bible prophecy. <u>http://biblehub.com/greek/1955.htm</u>

<u>Gen 40:8</u> And they said unto him, We have dreamed a dream, and *there is* no interpreter of it. And Joseph said unto them, *Do* **not interpretations** *belong* to God? tell me *them*, I pray you. <u>Gen 41:16</u> And Joseph answered Pharaoh, saying, *It is* not in me: God shall give Pharaoh an answer of peace.

Dan. 2:28 But there is a God in heaven that revealeth secrets, and maketh known to the king Nebuchadnezzar what shall be in the latter days. Thy dream, and the visions of thy head upon thy bed, are these;
