# THE SECOND EPISTLE GENERAL OF PETER 2 Pet. 2:15-19

- <u>2 Pet. 2:15</u> Which have forsaken the right way, and are gone astray, following the way of Balaam *the son* of Bosor, who loved the wages of unrighteousness;
- 16 But was rebuked for his iniquity: the dumb ass speaking with man's voice forbad the madness of the prophet.
- 17 These are wells without water, clouds that are carried with a tempest; to whom the mist of darkness is reserved for ever.
- 18 For when they speak great swelling words of vanity, they allure through the lusts of the flesh, through much wantonness, those that were clean escaped from them who live in error.
- 19 While they promise them liberty, they themselves are the servants of corruption: for of whom a man is overcome, of the same is he brought in bondage.

Original Word: καταλείπω

Transliteration: kataleipó

Definition: I leave behind, desert, abandon, forsake; I leave

remaining, reserve.

Original Word: εὐθύς Transliteration: euthus

Definition: adj: (a) right, correct, or straight of direction, as opposed to crooked, (b) upright; adv: immediately.

euthýs – properly, straight, without unnecessary zig-zags (detours); upright (not crooked, bent); (figuratively) without delay; acting immediately, "straightway," taking a direct path from "God's point A" to "God's point B" which avoids unnecessary delays (deviations). http://biblehub.com/greek/2117.htm

Original Word: πλανάω Transliteration: planaó

Definition: I lead astray, deceive, cause to wander.

planáō – properly, go astray, get off-course; to deviate from the correct path (circuit, course), roaming into error, wandering; (passive) be misled.

[(planáō) is the root of the English term, planet ("wandering body"). This term nearly always conveys the sin of roaming (for an exception – see Heb. 11:38).]

Original Word: ἐξακολουθέω Transliteration: exakoloutheó Definition: I follow after, imitate.

eksakolouthéō (from ek, "wholly out from," intensifying akolouthéō, "follow") – properly, completely follow (literally, "wholly out from"), i.e. closely imitating (emulating) someone as a model or leader. <a href="http://biblehub.com/greek/1811.htm">http://biblehub.com/greek/1811.htm</a>

2 Pet. 2:15 Which have forsaken the right way, and are gone astray, following the way of Balaam the son of Bosor, who loved the wages of unrighteousness;

Jude 1:11 Woe unto them! for they have gone in the way of Cain, and ran greedily after the error of Balaam for reward, and perished in the gainsaying of Core.

Rev. 2:14 But I have a few things against thee, because thou hast there them that hold the doctrine of Balaam, who taught Balac to cast a stumblingblock before the children of Israel, to eat things sacrificed unto idols, and to commit fornication.

- The Way of Balaam = loving the wages of unrighteousness
- The Error of Balaam = settling for the permissive will of God
- The Doctrine of Balaam = worldliness compromise in joining the heathen
  - (2) Balaam's madness, 2:16
- 2 Pet. 2:16 But was rebuked for his iniquity: the dumb ass speaking with man's voice forbad the madness of the prophet.

Original Word: ἔλεγξις Transliteration: elegxis Definition: rebuke, reproof, refutation.

*élegksis* (a feminine noun) – the brand of *conviction* that *rebukes* the sin of double-mindedness. <u>See 2</u> Pet 2:16 (the only occurrence of *élegksis*) where the rebuke fits, being upbraided by a *talking-donkey* (where the ass had more sense than Balaam)! <a href="http://biblehub.com/greek/1649.htm">http://biblehub.com/greek/1649.htm</a>

Luke 15:17 And when he came to himself, he said, How many hired servants of my father's have bread enough and to spare, and I perish with hunger!

  - (1) Their empty profession, 2:17
    - (a) Their description, 2:17a-b

i. They sink to the deepest depths, 2:17a "These are wells without water..."

Jude 1:12 These are spots in your feasts of charity, when they feast with you, feeding themselves without fear: clouds *they are* without water, carried about of winds; trees whose fruit withereth, without fruit, twice dead, plucked up by the roots; 13 Raging waves of the sea, foaming out their own shame; wandering stars, to whom is reserved the blackness of darkness for ever.

Mt. 25:30 And cast ye the unprofitable servant into outer darkness: there shall be weeping and gnashing of teeth.

- 1 Jn. 1:5 This then is the message which we have heard of him, and declare unto you, that God is light, and in him is no darkness at all.
- 6 If we say that we have fellowship with him, and walk in darkness, we lie, and do not the truth:
- Rev 20:14 And death and hell were cast into the lake of fire. This is the second death.
- 15 And whosoever was not found written in the book of life was cast into the lake of fire.
  - ii. They soar to the highest heights, 2:17b "...clouds that are carried with a tempest..."
  - (b) Their destruction, 2:17c "...to whom the mist of darkness is reserved for ever."

- (2) Their empty preaching, 2:18
  - (a) Boastful words, 2:18a "For when they speak great swelling words of vanity..."

Jude 1:16 These are murmurers, complainers, walking after their own lusts; and their mouth speaketh great swelling words, having men's persons in admiration because of advantage.

(b) Beguiling words, 2:18b "...they allure through the lusts of the flesh, through much wantonness..."

Jas. 1:14 But every man is tempted, when he is drawn away of his own lust, and enticed.

<u>2 Pet. 2:14</u> Having eyes full of adultery, and that cannot cease from sin; beguiling unstable souls: an heart they have exercised with covetous practices; cursed children:

Original Word: δελεάζω Transliteration: deleazó

Short Definition: I allure, entice by a bait

deleázō (from delear, "bait") – properly, to bait a hook or set a trap with bait; (figuratively) entice a victim into a moral trap, luring them in through their own selfish impulses <a href="http://biblehub.com/greek/1185.htm">http://biblehub.com/greek/1185.htm</a>

  - (a) The trap, 2:19a "While they promise them liberty, they themselves are the servants of corruption..."
  - (b) The truth, 2:19b "...for of whom a man is overcome, of the same is he brought in bondage."

Luke 6:39 And he spake a parable unto them, Can the blind lead the blind? shall they not both fall into the ditch?

Mt. 23:15 Woe unto you, scribes and Pharisees, hypocrites! for ye compass sea and land to make one proselyte, and when he is made, ye make him twofold more the child of hell than yourselves.

- 9 Not of works, lest any man should boast.
- 10 For we are his workmanship, created in Christ Jesus unto good works, which God hath before ordained that we should walk in them.
