Original Word: ἐπιδέχομαι Transliteration: epidechomai Definition: I accept, admit, welcome.

epidéxomai (from *epí*, "*on*, fitting" and *dexomai*, "welcome") – properly, receive (welcome) *upon*, emphasizing what naturally *builds on* the welcoming (note the prefix *epi*, *upon*).

epidéxomai ("welcoming with its effects") is negated both times it occurs in the NT (3 Jn 9-10). This envisions all the "nasty spinoffs" that went with Diotrephes *refusing* to "aptly welcome" people into his local church.

<u>Mt. 18:17</u> And if he shall neglect to hear them, tell it unto the church: but if he neglect to hear the church, let him be unto thee as an heathen man and a publican.

Original Word: φλυαρέω Transliteration: phluareó Definition: I gossip against, talk idly, make empty charges against, talk nonsense. ("prating against")

phlyaréō (from *phlýaros*, "to bubble up, boil over") – overflowing with speech "that is *fluent but empty*" (*WS*, 562). It is used only in 3 Jn 10 <u>http://biblehub.com/greek/5396.htm</u>

Conclusion
