<u>Rev. 2:1-7</u>

<u>Rev. 2:1</u> Unto the angel of the church of Ephesus write; These things saith he that holdeth the seven stars in his right hand, who walketh in the midst of the seven golden candlesticks;

- <u>2</u> I know thy works, and thy labour, and thy patience, and how thou canst not bear them which are evil: and thou hast tried them which say they are apostles, and are not, and hast found them liars:
- <u>3</u> And hast borne, and hast patience, and for my name's sake hast laboured, and hast not fainted.
- <u>4</u> Nevertheless I have *somewhat* against thee, because thou hast left thy first love.
- 5 Remember therefore from whence thou art fallen, and repent, and do the first works; or else I will come unto thee quickly, and will remove thy candlestick out of his place, except thou repent.
- <u>6</u> But this thou hast, that thou hatest the deeds of the Nicolaitans, which I also hate.
- <u>7</u> He that hath an ear, let him hear what the Spirit saith unto the churches; To him that overcometh will I give to eat of the tree of life, which is in the midst of the paradise of God.

Introduction: The Full Churches, Ch. 2-3

A. The Churches Viewed Practically

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The "seven churches" were contemporary congregations that may represent seven specific periods of church history. Note the meaning of their names:

Ephesus = "fully purposed" = The Formal Church Smyrna = "myrrh" = The Fearful Church Pergamos = "much marriage" = The Faltering Church Thyatira = "odor of affliction" = The False Church Sardis = "red ones" = The Fruitless Church Philadelphia = brotherly love" = The Feeble Church Laodicea = "civil rights" or "the rights/justice of the people" = The Fashionable Church

B. The Churches Viewed Perennially

Problems and weaknesses of churches throughout the ages can identify with these seven churches.

Ephesus = *fundamentalism* – busy and outwardly sound, but not very loving.

Smyrna = *ritualism* – from the "synagogue of Satan" to Judaism – very ritualistic.

Pergamos = *clericalism* – setting up a separate caste system to officiate in matters religious.

Thyatira = *sacerdotalism* – Jezebel and "Baal worship," etc. – priesthood has such power.

Sardis = *liberalism* – reputation for dynamic church, but is actually dead (2 Tim. 3:5)


Philadelphia = *revivalism* – greatest movement of God in history.

Laodicea = *materialism* – worldly emphasis on material affluence.

C. The Churches Viewed Prophetically Ephesus = *the post-apostolic church* – "thou hast fallen" Smyrna = *the persecuted church* – "tribulation ten days" Pergamos = the patronized church – "the doctrine of Balaam" Thyatira = *the papal church* – "that woman Jezebel" Sardis = the protestant church – "a name that thou livest, and art dead" Philadelphia = the practical church – "an open door" Laodicea = the present-day church – "lukewarm" = loss of distinctives I. 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A. The Faithful Works of This Church, 2:1-3

1. It Was Standing Up to the Task, 2:1-2a

a. Christ is Omnipotent, 2:1

<u>Rev. 2:1</u> "Unto the angel of the church of Ephesus write; These things saith he that holdeth the seven stars in his right hand, who walketh in the midst of the seven golden candlesticks;

Original Word: κρατέω **Transliteration:** krateó **Definition:** I am strong, mighty, hence: I rule, am master, prevail; I obtain, take hold of; I hold, hold fast.

kratéō – to place under one's grasp (seize hold of, put under control).

b. Christ is Omniscient, 2:2a "I know thy works, and thy labour, and thy patience..."

Original Word: οἶδα **Transliteration:** eidó **Definition: | know**, remember, appreciate.

eídō (oida) – properly, to see with physical eyes (cf. Ro 1:11), as it naturally bridges to the metaphorical sense: perceiving ("mentally seeing"). This is akin to the expressions: "I see what You mean";
"I see what you are saying.

eídō ("seeing that becomes knowing") then is a gateway to grasp spiritual truth (reality) from a physical plane. (eídō) then is physical seeing (sight) which should be the constant bridge to mental and spiritual seeing (comprehension). <u>https://biblehub.com/greek/1492.htm</u>

Original Word: ἕργον **Transliteration:** ergon **Definition: work**, task, employment; a deed, action; that which is wrought or made, a work.

érgon (from *ergō*, "to work, accomplish") – a *work* or *worker* who accomplishes something. *érgon* ("work") is a deed (action) that carries out (completes) an *inner desire* (intension, purpose). <u>https://biblehub.com/greek/2041.htm</u>

Original Word: κόπος **Transliteration:** kopos **Definition:** (a) trouble, (b) toil, **labor**, laborious toil, involving weariness and fatigue.

kópos (from *kóptō*, "to hit, strike") – properly, a strike (blow) that is so hard, it seriously weakens or debilitates; (figuratively) *deep fatigue*, extreme *weariness* (*wearisome toil*). <u>https://biblehub.com/greek/2873.htm</u>

Original Word: ὑπομονή **Transliteration:** hupomoné **Definition:** endurance, steadfastness, patient waiting for, patience.

hypomoné (from *hypó*, "under" and *ménō*, "remain, endure") – properly, *remaining under*, endurance; steadfastness, especially as *God enables* the believer to "*remain* (*endure*) *under*" the challenges He allots in life. <u>https://biblehub.com/greek/5281.htm</u>

2. It Was Standing Up for the Truth, 2:2b "...and how thou canst not bear them which are evil: and thou hast tried them which say they are apostles, and are not, and hast found them liars"

Original Word: βαστάζω **Transliteration:** bastazó **Definition:** (a) I carry, **bear**, (b) I carry (take) away. <u>https://biblehub.com/greek/941.htm</u> **Original Word:** πειράζω **Transliteration:** peirazó **Definition:** I try, tempt, test.

peirázō (from *peíra*, "test, trial") – "originally to *test*, to *try* which was its usual meaning in the ancient Greek" (*WP*, 1, 30). "The word means *either test or tempt*" (*WP*, 1, 348). *Context alone* determines which sense is intended, or if both apply *simultaneously*. <u>https://biblehub.com/greek/3985.htm</u>

3. It Was Standing Up in the Test, 2:3

<u>Rev. 2:3</u> And hast borne, and hast patience, and for my name's sake hast laboured, and hast not fainted.

Particularly commendable was the faithful "perseverance" of this church (v. 3).

Original Word: κοπιάω **Transliteration:** kopiaó **Definition:** (a) I grow weary, (b) I toil, work with effort (of bodily and mental labor alike).

kopiáō (from *kópos*, "exhausting labor") – to labor until worn-out, depleted (exhausted). (*kopos*). <u>https://biblehub.com/greek/2872.htm</u>

B. The Fatal Weakness of This Church, 2:4-5a

1. The Vitality of Their Passion Was Gone, 2:4

<u>Rev. 2:4</u> Nevertheless I have *somewhat* against thee, because thou hast left thy first love.

2. The Validity of Their Profession Was Gone, 2:5a "Remember therefore from whence thou art fallen..." C. The Forceful Warning to This Church, 2:5b-7

1. Love Must Be Absolutely Paramount, 2:5b "...and repent, and do the first works; or else I will come unto thee quickly, and will remove thy candlestick out of his place, except thou repent."

The corrective for a cold heart that the Lord prescribed was a three-step process:

(1) "remember" how they used to feel about Him (first love)

(2) "repent" (change their attitude)

(3) *return* to the love that formerly motivated them ("do the deeds you did at first").

2. Love Must Be Absolutely Positive, 2:6

<u>Rev. 2:6</u> But this thou hast, that thou hatest the deeds of the Nicolaitans, which I also hate.

3. Love Must Be Absolutely Personal, 2:7

<u>Rev. 2:7</u> He that hath an ear, let him hear what the Spirit saith unto the churches; To him that overcometh will I give to eat of the tree of life, which is in the midst of the paradise of God.

<u>1 Jn. 2:13</u> I write unto you, fathers, because ye have known him that is from the beginning. I write unto you, young men, because ye have overcome the wicked one. I write unto you, little children, because ye have known the Father.

<u>1 Jn. 4:4</u> Ye are of God, little children, and have overcome them: because greater is he that is in you, than he that is in the world.

<u>Conclusion</u>

<u>1 Jn. 5:3</u> For this is the love of God, that we keep his commandments: and his commandments are not grievous. <u>4</u> For whatsoever is born of God overcometh the world: and this is the victory that overcometh the world, even our faith. <u>5</u> Who is he that overcometh the world, but he that believeth that Jesus is the Son of God?
