


Acts 20:1 And after the uproar was ceased, Paul called unto him the disciples, and embraced them, and departed for to go into Macedonia. 2 And when he had gone over those parts, and had given them much exhortation, he came into Greece, 3 And there abode three months. And when the Jews laid wait for him, as he was about to sail into Syria, he purposed to return through Macedonia. 4 And there accompanied him into Asia Sopater of Berea; and of the Thessalonians, Aristarchus and Secundus; and Gaius of Derbe, and Timotheus; and of Asia, Tychicus and Trophimus. 5 These going before tarried for us at Troas. 6 And we sailed away from Philippi after the days of unleavened bread, and came unto them to Troas in five days; where we abode seven days.

<u>7</u> And upon the first *day* of the week, when the disciples came together to break bread, Paul preached unto them, ready to depart on the morrow; and continued his speech until midnight.

a. Paul and His Movements, 20:1b-3

Acts 20:2 And when he had gone over those parts, and had given them much exhortation, he came into Greece, <u>3</u> And *there* abode three months. And when the Jews laid wait for him, as he was about to sail into Syria, he purposed to return through Macedonia.

<u>2 Cor. 2:12</u> Furthermore, when I came to Troas to *preach* Christ's gospel, and a door was opened unto me of the Lord, <u>13</u> I had no rest in my spirit, because I found not Titus my brother: but taking my leave of them, I went from thence into Macedonia. <u>2 Cor. 7:5</u> For, when we were come into Macedonia, our flesh had no rest, but we were troubled on every side; without *were* fightings, within *were* fears.
<u>6</u> Nevertheless God, that comforteth those that are cast down, comforted us by the coming of Titus;
<u>7</u> And not by his coming only, but by the consolation wherewith he was comforted in you, when he told us your earnest desire, your mourning, your fervent mind toward me; so that I rejoiced the

more.

## (a) Their Introduction, 20:4



2. Troas: Be Sincere, 20:6c-16

a. The Memorable Meeting, 20:6c-8

i. The Late Supper, 20:6c-7a "...where we abode seven days.<u>7</u> And upon the first *day* of the week, when the disciples came together to break bread..."

Jn. 20:19 Then the same day at evening, being the first day of the week, when the doors were shut where the disciples were assembled for fear of the Jews, came Jesus and stood in the midst, and saith unto them, Peace be unto you.

<u>1 Cor. 16:2</u> Upon the first *day* of the week let every one of you lay by him in store, as *God* hath prospered him, that there be no gatherings when I come.

Rev. 1:10 I was in the Spirit on the Lord's day, and heard behind me a great voice, as of a trumpet,

(a) Sincere Compassion, 20:10a "And Paul went down, and fell on him, and embracing *him* said, Trouble not yourselves..."

(b) Significant Caution, 20:10b "...Trouble not yourselves for his life is in him."

(c) Sensible Counsel, 20:11a "When he therefore was come up again, and had broken bread, and eaten..."

(d) Spiritual Conversation, 20:11b "...and talked a long while, even till break of day, so he departed."
