

Acts 24:17 Now after many years I came to bring alms to my nation, and offerings.

<u>18</u> Whereupon certain Jews from Asia found me purified in the temple, neither with multitude, nor with tumult.

- <u>19</u> Who ought to have been here before thee, and object, if they had ought against me.
- <u>20</u> Or else let these same *here* say, if they have found any evil doing in me, while I stood before the council,
- 21 Except it be for this one voice, that I cried standing among them, Touching the resurrection of the dead I am called in question by you this day.

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(4) Paul's Contention, 24:17-19

(a) Why He Was in the Capital, 24:17

Acts 24:17 Now after many years I came to bring alms to my nation, and offerings.

(b) Why He Was in Custody, 24:18-19

Acts 24:18 Whereupon certain Jews from Asia found me purified in the temple, neither with multitude, nor with tumult. <u>19</u> Who ought to have been here before thee, and object, if they had ought against me.

## (5) Paul's Conscience, 24:20-21

Acts 24:20 Or else let these same here say, if they have found any evil doing in me, while I stood before the council, 21 Except it be for this one voice, that I cried standing among them, Touching the resurrection of the dead I am called in question by you this day.

c. How the Charge Was Manipulated, 24:22-27

(1) Paul's Fresh Imprisonment, 24:22-23

(a) The Case Was Deferred When It Should Have Been Dismissed, 24:22

<u>Acts 24:22</u> And when Felix heard these things, having more perfect knowledge of *that* way, he deferred them, and said, When Lysias the chief captain shall come down, I will know the uttermost of your matter. (b) The Captive Was Given Leniency When He Should Have Been Given Liberty, 24:23

<u>Acts 24:23</u> And he commanded a centurion to keep Paul, and to let *him* have liberty, and that he should forbid none of his acquaintance to minister or come unto him.

(2) Paul's Further Interrogation, 24:24-25

(a) The Reason for It, 24:24

<u>Acts 24:24</u> And after certain days, when Felix came with his wife Drusilla, which was a Jewess, he sent for Paul, and heard him concerning the faith in Christ. (b) The Reproof of It, 24:25a "And as he reasoned of righteousness, temperance, and judgment to come..."

Original Word: διαλέγομαι Transliteration: dialegomai Definition: to discuss, to address, to preach Usage: I converse, address, preach, lecture; I argue, reason.

*dialégomai* – properly, "getting a *conclusion across*" by exchanging thoughts (logic) – "mingling thought with thought, to ponder (*revolve in the mind*)" (J. Thayer).

*dialégomai* ("getting a conclusion across") occurs 13 times in the NT, usually of believers exercising "dialectical reasoning." This is the process of *giving and receiving* information with someone to *reach deeper understanding* – a "going back-and-forth" of thoughts and ideas so people can better know the Lord (His word, will). Doing this is perhaps the most telling characteristic of the growing Christian!

Jn. 16:8 And when he is come, he will reprove the world of sin, and of righteousness, and of judgment:
9 Of sin, because they believe not on me;
10 Of righteousness, because I go to my Father, and ye see me no more;

11 Of judgment, because the prince of this world is judged.

RIGHTEOUSNESS = The challenge of God's standard of holiness.

TEMPERANCE = The challenge of self-control unto God's standard of holiness.

JUDGMENT = The challenge of accountability for responsibility in meeting God's standard of holiness. (c) The Reaction to It, 24:25b "...Felix trembled, and answered, Go thy way for this time; when I have a convenient season, I will call for thee."

This is an example of witnessing by Paul, manly Christianity at its finest!

Felix was facing a spirit-filled man of God, and his reaction is evidence of the convicting power of the Holy Spirit.

Original Word: ἕμφοβος Transliteration: emphobos Definition: terrible, in fear (used of godly fear) Usage: full of fear, terrified. https://biblehub.com/greek/1719.htm Felix was rejecting the truth by postponing a decision, which is, in essence, a decision in itself.

(3) Paul's Flawless Integrity, 24:26

<u>Acts 24:26</u> He hoped also that money should have been given him of Paul, that he might loose him: wherefore he sent for him the oftener, and communed with him.

Motive revealed = love of money.

<u>Mt. 7:13</u> Enter ye in at the strait gate: for wide *is* the gate, and broad *is* the way, that leadeth to destruction, and many there be which go in thereat: <u>14</u> Because strait *is* the gate, and narrow *is* the way, which leadeth unto life, and few there be that find it.

## (4) Paul's Further Incarceration, 24:27

<u>Acts 24:27</u> But after two years Porcius Festus came into Felix' room: and Felix, willing to shew the Jews a pleasure, left Paul bound.

## **Conclusion**

<u>2 Cor. 6:1</u> We then, *as* workers together *with him*, beseech *you* also that ye receive not the grace of God in vain.

<u>2</u> (For he saith, I have heard thee in a time accepted, and in the day of salvation have I succoured thee: behold, now is the accepted time; behold, now is the day of salvation.)

<u>3</u> Giving no offence in any thing, that the ministry be not blamed:

<u>4</u> "But in all *things* approving ourselves as the ministers of God..."

<u>1 Cor. 4:1</u> Let a man so account of us, as of the ministers of Christ, and stewards of the mysteries of God. <u>2</u> Moreover it is required in stewards, that a man be found faithful.
