
B. Proving the Power of God, 28:1-31

1. Power over Serpents, 28:1-6

a. What the People Wrought, 28:1-2

(1) The Name of the Island, 28:1

Acts 28:1 And when they were escaped, then they knew that the island was called Melita.





#### (2) The Nature of the Islanders, 28:2

<u>Acts 28:2</u> And the barbarous people shewed us no little kindness: for they kindled a fire, and received us every one, because of the present rain, and because of the cold.

Rom. 1:14 I am debtor both to the Greeks, and to the Barbarians; both to the wise, and to the unwise.

<u>1 Cor. 14:11</u> Therefore if I know not the meaning of the voice, I shall be unto him that speaketh a barbarian, and he that speaketh *shall be* a barbarian unto me.

b. What the People Thought, 28:3-6

(1) They Thought Paul Was Guilty, 28:3-4

### (a) What They Saw, 28:3

<u>Acts 28:3</u> And when Paul had gathered a bundle of sticks, and laid *them* on the fire, there came a viper out of the heat, and fastened on his hand.

**Original Word:** ἔχιδνα **Transliteration:** echidna **Definition:** a viper

*éxidna* – properly, a poisonous snake; (figuratively) incisive words that deliver *deadly venom*, with the use of blasphemy.

### (b) What They Said, 28:4

<u>Acts 28:4</u> And when the barbarians saw the *venomous* beast hang on his hand, they said among themselves, No doubt this man is a murderer, whom, though he hath escaped the sea, yet vengeance suffereth not to live. <u>Gen. 9:5</u> And surely your blood of your lives will I require; at the hand of every beast will I require it, and at the hand of man; at the hand of every man's brother will I require the life of man.

Num. 35:31 Moreover ye shall take no satisfaction for the life of a murderer, which *is* guilty of death: but he shall be surely put to death.

Rom. 2:14 For when the Gentiles, which have not the law, do by nature the things contained in the law, these, having not the law, are a law unto themselves:

(2) They Thought Paul Was God, 28:5-6

Acts 28:5 And he shook off the beast into the fire, and felt no harm.

<u>6</u> Howbeit they looked when he should have swollen, or fallen down dead suddenly: but after they had looked a great while, and saw no harm come to him, they changed their minds, and said that he was a god. Mark 16:18 They shall take up serpents; and if they drink any deadly thing, it shall not hurt them; they shall lay hands on the sick, and they shall recover.

Luke 10:19 Behold, I give unto you power to tread on serpents and scorpions, and over all the power of the enemy: and nothing shall by any means hurt you.

How can we shake off tragedies that rob us of our joy? Shaking Off the Viper

- 1. <u>Take Action</u> Paul did not leave the viper stay fastened to his hand.
- Face the adversity and seek a remedy = perseverance.
- Follow the advice of one spiritually respected = prayer.

2. <u>Treasure Assurances</u> – Remember the promises of the Lord and His Word.

3. Trust Always - Prov. 3:5-6, Rom. 8:28, Heb. 13:5

<u>Prov. 3:5</u> Trust in the LORD with all thine heart; and lean not unto thine own understanding. 6 In all thy ways acknowledge him, and he shall direct thy paths.

Rom. 8:28 And we know that all things work together for good to them that love God, to them who are the called according to *his* purpose.

<u>Heb. 13:5</u> Let your conversation be without covetousness; and be content with such things as ye have: for he hath said, I will never leave thee, nor forsake thee.

Psa. 34:4 I sought the LORD, and he heard me, and delivered me from all my fears. ... <u>18 The LORD *is* nigh unto them that are of a broken heart; and</u> saveth such as be of a contrite spirit. <u>1 Sam. 17:37</u> David said moreover, The LORD that delivered me out of the paw of the lion, and out of the paw of the bear, he will deliver me out of the hand of this Philistine. And Saul said unto David, Go, and the LORD be with thee.

<u>Isa. 41:10</u> Fear thou not; for I *am* with thee: be not dismayed; for I *am* thy God: I will strengthen thee; yea, I will help thee; yea, I will uphold thee with the right hand of my righteousness.

Psa. 23:1 The LORD *is* my shepherd; I shall not want. 2 He maketh me to lie down in green pastures: he leadeth me beside the still waters.

<u>3</u> He restoreth my soul: he leadeth me in the paths of righteousness for his name's sake.

# Isa. 26:3 Thou wilt keep him in perfect peace, whose mind is stayed on thee: because he trusteth in thee.

Phil. 4:6 Be careful for nothing; but in every thing by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known unto God.

7 And the peace of God, which passeth all understanding, shall keep your hearts and minds through Christ Jesus.

<u>8</u> Finally, brethren, whatsoever things are true, whatsoever things *are* honest, whatsoever things *are* just, whatsoever things *are* pure, whatsoever things *are* lovely, whatsoever things *are* of good report; if *there be* any virtue, and if *there be* any praise, think on these things.

<u>9</u> Those things, which ye have both learned, and received, and heard, and seen in me, do: and the God of peace shall be with you.

### **Application**

- Paul's life was endangered several times and was not yet in Rome.
- Barbarous, unsaved people have the capacity to show kindness and concern that too often puts professing Christians to shame.
- Sometimes, while doing menial, harmless and routine activities, tragedy strikes.
- When we encounter unfortunate circumstances, others may judge and offer opinions that are not needed, nor an accurate appraisal of the situation.
- When we are "snake bit," we need to shake it off and stay focused upon Scriptural priorities.

The unsaved, or backslidden, shallow Christians too often are "fickle faultfinders," changing from condemnation to commendation with exaggerated acclamation.

Such double-mindedness (Jas. 1:8) should motivate a strong believer to "consider the source" and become oblivious to frivolous opinions.
