



- Acts 28:7 In the same quarters were possessions of the chief man of the island, whose name was Publius; who received us, and lodged us three days courteously.

Original Word: δυσεντερία

Transliteration: dusenterion

**Definition:** dysentery

"This fever was possibly Malta fever, which was common in Malta, Gibraltar, and other Mediterranean islands. The microorganism has since been traced to the milk of the Maltese goats. The fever usually lasted four months, but sometimes could last as long as two or three years."

The illness could have been *cholera morbus* which includes fever and dysentery.

A bacterial disease causing severe diarrhea and dehydration, usually spread in water.

Cholera is rare in industrialized countries. It's fatal if not treated right away. Key symptoms are diarrhea and dehydration. Rarely, shock and seizures may occur in severe cases.

Treatment includes rehydration, IV fluids, and antibiotics.

- 1 US case in 2015
- Treatable by a medical professional
- Spreads through contaminated food or water
- Requires a medical diagnosis
- Lab tests or imaging always required
- Short-term: resolves within days to weeks

**Definition:** a valuing, a price

Usage: a price, honor.















Rom. 15:22 For which cause also I have been much hindered from coming to you.

- 23 But now having no more place in these parts, and having a great desire these many years to come unto you;
- 24 Whensoever I take my journey into Spain, I will come to you: for I trust to see you in my journey, and to be brought on my way thitherward by you, if first I be somewhat filled with your *company*.
- 25 But now I go unto Jerusalem to minister unto the saints.
