

2 Pet. 1:1 Simon Peter, a servant and an apostle of Jesus Christ, to them that have obtained like precious faith with us through the righteousness of God and our Saviour Jesus Christ: 2 Grace and peace be multiplied unto you through the knowledge of God, and of Jesus our Lord, <u>3</u> According as his divine power hath given unto us all things that pertain unto life and godliness, through the knowledge of him that hath called us to glory and virtue: <u>4</u> Whereby are given unto us exceeding great and precious promises: that by these ye might be partakers of the divine nature, having escaped the corruption that is in the world through lust. <u>5</u> And beside this, giving all diligence, add to your faith virtue; and to virtue knowledge; 6 And to knowledge temperance; and to temperance patience;

and to patience godliness;

A few weeks ago we began a new series from <u>2 Peter</u> – *"Arise and Build Your Faith."* This morning, we will modify the title to include...

"Arise and Build Your Faith – a Great Gift for Christmas"

Faith in Christ is the beginning, but, according to the Holy Spirit's moving upon the Apostle, faith needs to grow, and believers are commanded to develop a growing faith:

<u>2 Pet. 1:5</u> And beside this, giving all diligence, add to your faith..."

This passage begins by laying the foundation that is necessary to have BEFORE adding to our faith. According to the Scriptures, salvation rests entirely upon faith in the Lord Jesus Christ. Many professing Christians live with little assurance of salvation. We have considered three main concerns:

- 1. "How to be saved."
- 2. "How to be sure."
- 3. "How to be sanctified."

I. <u>FAITH'S CONVICTIONS</u>, 1:1-21 A. As to the walk with God, 1:1-15

**1.** The secret of commencing well, 1:1-4

- **2.** The secret of continuing well, 1:5-9
- There are seven vital aspects we are commanded to add to our foundation of faith –
- virtue
- knowledge
- temperance
- patience
- godliness
- brotherly kindness
   charity

These seven aspects can be grouped into three distinctive parts:

 The character of our faith; "virtue and knowledge"
 The character of our feelings; "temperance and patience"
 The character of our fellowship; "godliness, brotherly kindness, and charity"

a. The path of diligence, 1:5-8

i. Faithful addition, 1:5-7

(1) We must not only believe, but also behave,1:5a "And beside this, giving all diligence,add to your faith virtue..."

- The beginning of verse five stresses how important it is for a believer to "add" to the foundation of faith – "And beside this..."
- As important as the first four verses are in establishing the foundation of faith, verse five indicates that the next step is just as equally important.
- The "diligent" effort involved to add to our faith is expedient dedication.
- A believer is commanded to focus upon "adding" to the foundation of faith.
- The first spiritual ingredient listed to "add" to the foundation of faith is virtue.
- Such "virtue" is an active, desire of "moral energy" to invigorate the soul and encourages a believer to be a fearless witness for Christ.

(2) We must not only have integrity, but also be informed, 1:5b "...and to virtue knowledge;"

Scriptural knowledge applied to virtue = energetic zeal that is modified by truth.

As we approach the Christmas season, one of the best gifts you could give yourself, your loved ones, and your church, is to give yourself the commitment to adding to your faith.

We have covered the first two aspects of the command to "ADD" to our faith: virtue and knowledge. "Virtue" and "knowledge" exhibit the "character of our faith." This morning we will observe verse six which contains three more aspects: temperate, patience, and godliness.

We will focus upon "the character of our feelings" = "temperance and patience."

> (3) We must not only be taught, but also be temperate, 1:6a "And to knowledge temperance..."

## **TEMPERANCE**, noun [Latin temperantia, from tempero.]

1. Moderation; particularly, habitual moderation in regard to the indulgence of the natural appetites and passions; restrained or moderate indulgence; as *temperance* in eating and drinking; *temperance* in the indulgence of joy or mirth. *temperance* in eating and drinking is opposed to gluttony and drunkenness, and in other indulgences, to excess.

**2.** Patience; calmness; sedateness; moderation of passion. <a href="http://webstersdictionary1828.com/Dictionary/temperance">http://webstersdictionary1828.com/Dictionary/temperance</a>

### **Original Word:** ἐγκράτεια **Transliteration:** egkrateia **Usage:** self-mastery, self-restraint, self-control, continence.

egkráteia (from en, "in the sphere of" and krátos, "dominion, mastery") – properly, dominion within, i.e. "self-control" – proceeding out from within oneself, but not by oneself. For the believer, egkráteia ("self-control, Spirit-control") can only be accomplished by the power of the Lord. Accordingly, egkráteia ("true mastery from within") is explicitly called a *fruit of the Holy Spirit* (Gal 5:23). https://biblehub.com/greek/1466.htm

Temperance overcomes vulnerability and leads to a victorious life in Christ.

<u>Prov. 16:32</u> *He that is* slow to anger *is* better than the mighty; and **he that ruleth his spirit** than he that taketh a city.

<u>Prov. 25:28</u> He that hath no rule over his own spirit is like a city that is broken down, and without walls.

Temperance is a personal discipline that engages spiritual warfare.

<u>Rom. 13:14</u> But put ye on the Lord Jesus Christ, and make not provision for the flesh, to *fulfil* the lusts *thereof*.

<u>1 Pet. 2:11</u> Dearly beloved, I beseech *you* as strangers and pilgrims, abstain from fleshly lusts, which war against the soul;

Temperance is a daily requirement:

1 Cor. 15:31 "...I die daily."

Temperance is a perpetual battle within a believer's heart.

Rom. 7:14 For we know that the law is spiritual: but I am carnal, sold under sin. 15 For that which I do I allow not: for what I would, that do I not; but what I hate, that do I. 16 If then I do that which I would not, I consent unto the law that *it is* good. <u>17</u> Now then it is no more I that do it, but sin that dwelleth in me. 18 For I know that in me (that is, in my flesh,) dwelleth no good thing: for to will is present with me; but how to perform that which is good I find not. 19 For the good that I would I do not: but the evil which I would not, that I do. 20 Now if I do that I would not, it is no more I that do it, but sin

that dwelleth in me.

21 I find then a law, that, when I would do good, evil is present with me.

<u>22</u> For I delight in the law of God after the inward man:
<u>23</u> But I see another law in my members, warring against the
law of my mind, and bringing me into captivity to the law of sin which is in my members.

<u>24</u> O wretched man that I am! who shall deliver me from the body of this death?

25 I thank God through Jesus Christ our Lord. So then with the mind I myself serve the law of God; but with the flesh the law of sin.

If the Apostle Paul was perplexed about such a spiritual challenge, shouldn't we be concerned?

Temperance must include counteracting the flesh by walking in the Spirit.

<u>Gal. 5:16</u> This I say then, Walk in the Spirit, and ye shall not fulfil the lust of the flesh. <u>17</u> For the flesh lusteth against the Spirit, and the Spirit against the flesh: and these are contrary the one to the other: so that ye cannot do the things that ye would.

Walking in the Spirit includes spiritual activities:

• Contemplation:

Jn. 6:63 It is the spirit that quickeneth; the flesh profiteth nothing: the words that I speak unto you, *they* are spirit, and *they* are life. <u>Psa. 119:9</u> Wherewithal shall a young man cleanse his way? by taking heed *thereto* according to thy word. ... <u>11</u> Thy word have I hid in mine heart, that I might not sin against thee.

• Communication:

Mt. 26:41 Watch and pray, that ye enter not into temptation: the spirit indeed is willing, but the flesh is weak.

<u>1 Cor. 14:15</u> What is it then? I will pray with the spirit, and I will pray with the understanding also: I will sing with the spirit, and I will sing with the understanding also.

#### • Concentration:

Eph. 5:17 Wherefore be ye not unwise, but understanding what the will of the Lord *is*.
18 And be not drunk with wine, wherein is excess; but be filled with the Spirit;
19 Speaking to yourselves in psalms and hymns and spiritual songs, singing and making melody in your heart to the Lord;
20 Giving thanks always for all things unto God and the Father in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ;
21 Submitting yourselves one to another in the fear of God.



- 2. Saturating, v. 18 "...filled with the Spirit;"
- 3. Speaking, v. 19a "Speaking to yourselves..."
- 4. Singing, v. 19b "...singing and making melody in your heart to the Lord;"
- 5. Sensing, v. 20 "Giving thanks for all things..."
- 6. Submitting, v. 21 "…yourselves one to another in the fear of God."

(4) We must not only be in possession, but also have patience, 1:6b

**PATIENCE**, *noun* pa'shens. [Latin patientia, from patior, to suffer.] **1.** The suffering of afflictions, pain, toil, calamity, provocation or other evil, with a calm, unruffled temper; endurance without murmuring or fretfulness. *patience* may spring from constitutional fortitude, from a kind of heroic pride, or from Christian submission to the divine will.

2. A calm temper which bears evils without murmuring or discontent.
3. The act or quality of waiting long for justice or expected good without discontent.

Have patience with me, and I will pay thee all. Matthew 18:26.

- **4.** Perseverance; constancy in labor or exertion. He learnt with *patience* and with meekness taught.
- **5.** The quality of bearing offenses and injuries without anger or revenge. <u>http://webstersdictionary1828.com/Dictionary/patience</u>

**Original Word:** ὑπομονή **Transliteration:** hupomoné **Definition:** a remaining behind, a patient enduring **Usage:** endurance, steadfastness, patient waiting for.

hypomoné (from hypó, "under" and ménō, "remain, endure") – properly, remaining under, endurance; steadfastness, especially as God enables the believer to "remain (endure) under" the challenges He allots in life. https://biblehub.com/greek/5281.htm

Patience is spiritual maturity manifested by endurance, an indication of genuine spirituality.

Luke 8:15 But that on the good ground are they, which in an honest and good heart, having heard the word, keep it, and bring forth fruit with patience.

## Luke 21:19 In your patience possess ye your souls.

The awareness to control emotional challenges during difficult times is an addition to faith that produces spiritual maturity for endurance.

<u>Heb. 12:1</u> Wherefore seeing we also are compassed about with so great a cloud of witnesses, let us lay aside every weight, and the sin which doth so easily beset *us*, and **let us run with patience** the race that is set before us,

Jas. 1:3 Knowing this, that the trying of your faith worketh patience.

<u>4</u> But let patience have her perfect work, that ye may be perfect and entire, wanting nothing.
