

Eccl. 1:12 I the Preacher was king over Israel in Jerusalem.

13 And I gave my heart to seek and search out by wisdom concerning all *things* that are done under heaven: this sore travail hath God given to the sons of man to be exercised therewith.

14 I have seen all the works that are done under the sun; and, behold, all is vanity and vexation of spirit.

15 That which is crooked cannot be made straight: and that which is wanting cannot be numbered.

16 I communed with mine own heart, saying, Lo, I am come to great estate, and have gotten more wisdom than all *they* that have been before me in Jerusalem: yea, my heart had great experience of wisdom and knowledge.

Metaphysics and Cosmology were involved in 1:5-8. Now we move on to axiology:

Axiology is the branch of philosophy dealing with values, as those of ethics, aesthetics, or religion. https://www.dictionary.com/browse/axiology?s=t

The term axiology comes from the Greek *axios* or **worth**. In philosophy, axiology is that field that concerns itself with the subject of value and all pro and con assertions. In the context of worldview, your axiology consists of your beliefs about the nature of value and what is valuable: what is good and what is bad, what is right and what is wrong. Virtually all elements of your worldview, from your epistemology to your anthropology, are intimately related to your axiology and it is your beliefs about the value of things that are the proximate cause for most of your behavior. http://web.engr.oregonstate.edu/~funkk/Personal/worldview.html

Eccl. 1:12 I the Preacher was king over Israel in Jerusalem.

The repetition of verse 1:1 found in 1:12 is a method for driving home the veracity of the identification of Solomon in Jerusalem (in case anyone missed it!) Shakespeare wrote, in *Julius Caesar*, Act 3, Scene 2, (Mark Anthony speaking...)

"The evil that men do lives after them; The good is oft interred with their bones."

(b) What He Determined, 1:13a "And I gave my heart to seek and search out by wisdom concerning all things that are done under heaven..."

(d) What He Discovered, 1:14-15

i. Man's Works Are Disappointing, 1:14

Eccl. 1:14 I have seen all the works that are done under the sun; and, behold, all is vanity and vexation of spirit.

ii. Man's Works Are Dismaying, 1:15

The Bentness of Things, 1:15a "That which is crooked cannot be made straight..."

Job 14:14 If a man die, shall he live again? all the days of my appointed time will I wait, till my change come.

Job 15:14 What is man, that he should be clean? and he which is born of a woman, that he should be righteous?

 Mankind is crooked. The world is crooked – the reason = the "god of this world."

<u>Isa. 27:1</u> In that day the LORD with his sore and great and strong sword shall punish leviathan the piercing serpent, **even leviathan that crooked serpent**; and he shall slay the dragon that *is* in the sea.

2 Cor. 4:4 In whom the god of this world hath blinded the minds of them which believe not, lest the light of the glorious gospel of Christ, who is the image of God, should shine unto them.

- The Bankruptcy of Things, 1:15b "...and that which is wanting cannot be numbered."
 - The barren woman lacks pregnancy;
 - The missionary lacks money;
 - The orphan lacks parents;
 - The government lacks integrity;
 - The movie stars lack morals;
 - The school system lacks God;
 - The desert lacks water;
 - The news media lacks honesty;
 - The religions systems lack truth;
 - The compromising churches lack power.

(2) His Further Quest: To Explore His Wisdom, 1:16-18

(a) His Success, 1:16

Eccl. 1:16 | communed with mine own heart, saying, Lo, I am come to great estate, and have gotten more wisdom than all *they* that have been before me in Jerusalem: yea, my heart had great experience of wisdom and knowledge.

Solomon was contemplating, and his thoughts are revealed:

Psa. 13:2 How long shall I take counsel in my soul, having sorrow in my heart daily? how long shall mine enemy be exalted over me?

- The empiricism discussed last week is manifested again at the end of verse 16: "...yea, my heart had great experience of wisdom and knowledge."
- Empiricism (roughly characterized): opinions are reasonable if, and only if, they are supported by evidence that is ultimately grounded in experience.

'Experience', here, can mean everyday observation using one or more of the five senses, but it is also meant to include rigorous scientific experimentation.

(b) His Search, 1:17-18

i. His Goal 1:17a "And I gave my heart to know wisdom, and to know madness and folly..."

 Solomon gave his heart, NOT to seek God and His will, but, "...to know wisdom, and to know madness and folly..."

ii. His Gloom, 1:17b "...I perceived that this also is vexation of spirit."

B. His Grief, 1:18

Eccl. 1:18 For in much wisdom is much grief: and he that increaseth knowledge increaseth sorrow.

Conclusion

Jas. 3:13 Who is a wise man and endued with knowledge among you? let him shew out of a good conversation his works with meekness of wisdom.

14 But if ye have bitter envying and strife in your hearts, glory not, and lie not against the truth.

15 This wisdom descendeth not from above, but is earthly, sensual, devilish.

16 For where envying and strife is, there is confusion and every evil work.

17 But the wisdom that is from above is first pure, then peaceable, gentle, and easy to be intreated, full of mercy and good fruits, without partiality, and without hypocrisy.

18 And the fruit of righteousness is sown in peace of them that make peace.
