

Eccl. 5:8 If thou seest the oppression of the poor, and violent perverting of judgment and justice in a province, marvel not at the matter: for *he that is* higher than the highest regardeth; and *there be* higher than they. 9 Moreover the profit of the earth is for all: the king *himself* is served by the field.

- 10 He that loveth silver shall not be satisfied with silver; nor he that loveth abundance with increase: this *is* also vanity.
- 11 When goods increase, they are increased that eat them: and what good *is there* to the owners thereof, saving the beholding *of them* with their eyes?
- 12 The sleep of a labouring man *is* sweet, whether he eat little or much: but the abundance of the rich will not suffer him to sleep.
- 13 There is a sore evil which I have seen under the sun, namely, riches kept for the owners thereof to their hurt.
- 14 But those riches perish by evil travail: and he begetteth a son, and there is nothing in his hand.

- 15 As he came forth of his mother's womb, naked shall he return to go as he came, and shall take nothing of his labour, which he may carry away in his hand.
- 16 And this also is a sore evil, that in all points as he came, so shall he go: and what profit hath he that hath laboured for the wind?
- 17 All his days also he eateth in darkness, and he hath much sorrow and wrath with his sickness.
- 18 Behold that which I have seen: it is good and comely for one to eat and to drink, and to enjoy the good of all his labour that he taketh under the sun all the days of his life, which God giveth him: for it is his portion.
- 19 Every man also to whom God hath given riches and wealth, and hath given him power to eat thereof, and to take his portion, and to rejoice in his labour; this *is* the gift of God.
- 20 For he shall not much remember the days of his life; because God answereth *him* in the joy of his heart.

 - (1) Wealth Acquired, 5:8-9
 - (a) By Injustice, 5:8

i. The Woe, 5:8a "If thou seest the oppression of the poor, and violent perverting of judgment and justice in a province, marvel not at the matter..."

- "Politicians" are ruthless, and their corruptible actions should not surprise anyone.
- The recent rioting is a by-product of a failing society.

• The lack of discipline, no fear of God, broken families and humanistic school systems are producing politicians that are more concerned about liberal agendas than the future of our nation.

Prov. 28:15 As a roaring lion, and a ranging bear; so is a wicked ruler over the poor people.

Prov. 29:2 When the righteous are in authority, the people rejoice: but when the wicked beareth rule, the people mourn.

We need to pray for all leaders, regardless of political affiliations.

1 Tim. 2:1 I exhort therefore, that, first of all, supplications, prayers, intercessions, and giving of thanks, be made for all men;

2 For kings, and for all that are in authority; that we may lead a quiet and peaceable life in all godliness and honesty.

ii. The Warning, 5:8b "...for he that is higher than the highest regardeth; and there be higher than they."

Rom. 13:1 Let every soul be subject unto the higher powers. For there is no power but of God: the powers that be are ordained of God.

- Verse 8 contains three perpetual problems in society:
 - 1. The constant "oppression of the poor;"
 - 2. The "violent perverting of judgment;"
 - 3. The "violent perverting of justice."
 - (b) By Integrity, 5:9

i. The Principle Inculcated, 5:9a "Moreover the profit of the earth is for all..."

The Lord Jesus Christ is THE greatest equalizer among mankind:

Gal. 3:28 There is neither Jew nor Greek, there is neither bond nor free, there is neither male nor female: for ye are all one in Christ Jesus.

ii. The Prince Included, 5:9b "...the king *himself* is served by the field."

 Regardless of status, all mankind is dust, and needs physical nourishment.

Job 34:15 All flesh shall perish together, and man shall turn again unto dust.

 Whether buried in a golden sarcophagus, or a pine box, humanity is equal in death.

Eccl. 3:20 All go unto one place; all are of the dust, and all turn to dust again.

(2) Wealth Accumulated, 5:10-11

(a) The Limitation of Wealth, 5;10

Eccl. 5:10 He that loveth silver shall not be satisfied with silver; nor he that loveth abundance with increase: this *is* also vanity.

1 Tim. 6:9 But they that will be rich fall into temptation and a snare, and *into* many foolish and hurtful lusts, which drown men in destruction and perdition.

10 For the love of money is the root of all evil: which while some coveted after, they have erred from the faith, and pierced themselves through with many sorrows.

(b) The Liability of Wealth, 5:11a "When goods increase, they are increased that eat them..."

 Wealth produces extravagance, which attracts an "entourage" of "friends," and creates added expenses.

Prov. 19:4 Wealth maketh many friends; but the poor is separated from his neighbour.

6 Many will intreat the favour of the prince: and every man is a friend to him that giveth gifts.

(c) The Lamentation of Wealth, 5:11b "...and what good is there to the owners thereof, saving the beholding of them with their eyes?"

 The "lust of the eyes" provides little satisfaction, with the exception of just "seeing."

Eccl. 1:8 All things are full of labour; man cannot utter it: the eye is not satisfied with seeing, nor the ear filled with hearing.

Eccl. 4:8 There is one *alone*, and *there is* not a second; yea, he hath neither child nor brother: yet *is there* no end of all his labour; **neither is his eye satisfied with riches**; neither *saith he*, For whom do I labour, and bereave my soul of good? This *is* also vanity, yea, it *is* a sore travail.

Prov. 27:20 Hell and destruction are never full; so the eyes of man are never satisfied.

2 Pet. 2:14 Having eyes full of adultery, and that cannot cease from sin; beguiling unstable souls: an heart they have exercised with covetous practices; cursed children:

<u>Col. 3:5</u> Mortify therefore your members which are upon the earth; fornication, uncleanness, inordinate affection, evil concupiscence, and covetousness, which is idolatry:

b. Words About the Deceitfulness of Riches, 5:12-20

(1) How Wealth Disturbs, 5:12

Eccl. 5:12 The sleep of a labouring man is sweet, whether he eat little or much: but the abundance of the rich will not suffer him to sleep.

- A troubled heart creates restlessness and deters sleep.
- Contentment in the Lord produces sweet sleep.

Psa. 4:8 I will both lay me down in peace, and sleep: for thou, LORD, only makest me dwell in safety.

Psa. 127:2 It is vain for you to rise up early, to sit up late, to eat the bread of sorrows: for so he giveth his beloved sleep.

Prov. 3:24 When thou liest down, thou shalt not be afraid: yea, thou shalt lie down, and thy sleep shall be sweet.

(2) How Wealth Disappears, 5:13-14

(a) The Reasons, 5:13

Eccl. 5:13 There is a sore evil which I have seen under the sun, namely, riches kept for the owners thereof to their hurt.

 The irony of selfishness in contrast to giving seems contradictory to the unspiritual.

Prov. 11:24 There is that scattereth, and yet increaseth; and there is that withholdeth more than is meet, but it tendeth to poverty.

25 The liberal soul shall be made fat: and he that watereth shall be watered also himself.

Prov. 13:7 There is that maketh himself rich, yet hath nothing: there is that maketh himself poor, yet hath great riches.

Psa. 41:1 Blessed is he that considereth the poor: the LORD will deliver him in time of trouble.

Prov. 19:17 He that hath pity upon the poor lendeth unto the LORD; and that which he hath given will he pay him again.

(b) The Result, 5:14

Eccl. 5:14 But those riches perish by evil travail: and he begetteth a son, and there is nothing in his hand.

Hag. 1:5 Now therefore thus saith the LORD of hosts; Consider your ways.

6 Ye have sown much, and bring in little; ye eat, but ye have not enough; ye drink, but ye are not filled with drink; ye clothe you, but there is none warm; and he that earneth wages earneth wages to put it into a bag with holes.

9 Ye looked for much, and, lo, it came to little; and when ye brought it home, I did blow upon it. Why? saith the LORD of hosts. Because of mine house that is waste, and ye run every man unto his own house.

(3) How Wealth Derides, 5:15-16

(a) What Does the Rich Man Leave, 5:15

Eccl. 5:15 As he came forth of his mother's womb, naked shall he return to go as he came, and shall take nothing of his labour, which he may carry away in his hand.

• The futility of reality – the finality of the grave.

(b) Why Does the Rich Man Labor, 5:16

Eccl. 5:16 And this also is a sore evil, that in all points as he came, so shall he go: and what profit hath he that hath laboured for the wind?

(4) How Wealth Darkens, 5:17-20

(a) The Misery it Brings, 5:17

Eccl. 5:17 All his days also he eateth in darkness, and he hath much sorrow and wrath with his sickness.

(b) The Materialism if Breeds, 5:18-20

i. The Materialist's Narrow Views,5:18

Eccl. 5:18 Behold that which I have seen: it is good and comely for one to eat and to drink, and to enjoy the good of all his labour that he taketh under the sun all the days of his life, which God giveth him: for it is his portion.

ii. The Materialist's Neglected Values, 5:19-20

What He Forgets, 5:19

Eccl. 5:19 Every man also to whom God hath given riches and wealth, and hath given him power to eat thereof, and to take his portion, and to rejoice in his labour; this is the gift of God.

Deut. 8:18 But thou shalt remember the LORD thy God: for *it is* he that giveth thee power to get wealth, that he may establish his covenant which he sware unto thy fathers, as *it is* this day.

1 Chron. 29:12 Both riches and honour come of thee, and thou reignest over all; and in thine hand is power and might; and in thine hand it is to make great, and to give strength unto all. ...

<u>14</u> But who *am* I, and what *is* my people, that we should be able to offer so willingly after this sort? for all things *come* of thee, and of thine own have we given thee.

What He Faces, 5:20

Eccl. 5:20 For he shall not much remember the days of his life; because God answereth him in the joy of his heart.

 As <u>Heb. 11</u> contains positive attributes of faith, leaving out the negative things, so will our memories focus upon the positive as we age and maintain fellowship with the Lord:

Psa. 16:11 Thou wilt shew me the path of life: in thy presence is fulness of joy; at thy right hand there are pleasures for evermore.

Conclusion

Acts 17:24 God that made the world and all things therein, seeing that he is Lord of heaven and earth, dwelleth not in temples made with hands;

25 Neither is worshipped with men's hands, as though he needed any thing, seeing he giveth to all life, and breath, and all things;
