

Eccl. 9:11 I returned, and saw under the sun, that the race *is* not to the swift, nor the battle to the strong, neither yet bread to the wise, nor yet riches to men of understanding, nor yet favour to men of skill; but time and chance happeneth to them all.

<u>12</u> For man also knoweth not his time: as the fishes that are taken in an evil net, and as the birds that are caught in the snare; so *are* the sons of men snared in an evil time, when it falleth suddenly upon them. <u>13</u> This wisdom have I seen also **under the sun**, and it *seemed* great unto me:

<u>14</u> *There was* a little city, and few men within it; and there came a great king against it, and besieged it, and built great bulwarks against it:

15 Now there was found in it a poor wise man, and he by his wisdom delivered the city; yet no man remembered that same poor man. 16 Then said I, Wisdom *is* better than strength: nevertheless the poor man's wisdom is despised, and his words are not heard. 17 The words of wise *men are* heard in quiet more than the cry of him that ruleth among fools. 18 Wisdom is better than weapons of war: but one sinner destroyeth much good.

a. The Triumph of Fate, 9:11-12

(1) The Unattainable, 9:11

(a) Choice: The Great Inequity of Life, 9:11a "I returned, and saw **under the sun**, that the race *is* not to the swift, nor the battle to the strong, neither yet bread to the wise, nor yet riches to men of understanding, nor yet favour to men of skill..."

- From the earthly perspective, things do not always turn out the way they are anticipated to happen:
 - "...the race *is* not to the swift..." The tortoise and the hare.
 - Asahel was fast and could "run like a deer;"

<u>2 Sam. 2:18</u> And there were three sons of Zeruiah there, Joab, and Abishai, and Asahel: and Asahel was as light of foot as a wild roe...(v. <u>23</u>)...Asahel fell down and died... "...nor the battle to the strong..." – David conquering Goliath. (<u>1 Sam. 17</u>)

"...neither yet bread to the wise..." – Elijah and the raven. (<u>1 Kings 17</u>)

• Micaiah, against Ahab (<u>1 Kings 22:7-28</u>)

1 Kings 22:8 And the king of Israel said unto Jehoshaphat, There is yet one man, Micaiah the son of Imlah, by whom we may enquire of the LORD: but I hate him; for he doth not prophesy good concerning me, but evil. And Jehoshaphat said, Let not the king say so. 18 And the king of Israel said unto Jehoshaphat, Did I not tell thee that he would prophesy no good concerning me, but evil? ... 27 And say, Thus saith the king, Put this fellow in the prison, and feed him with bread of affliction and with water of affliction, until I come in peace. 28 And Micaiah said, If thou return at all in peace, the LORD hath not spoken by me. And he said, Hearken, O people, every one of you.

 "…nor yet riches to men of understanding…" – The Apostle Paul

 "…nor yet favour to men of skill…" – The mariners in Jonah 1.

> (b) Chance: The Great Inevitability of Death, 9:11b "...but time and chance happeneth to them all."

• <u>Est. 4:14</u> "...and who knoweth whether thou art come to the kingdom for *such* a time as this?

- Being in the right, or wrong, place at the right, or wrong, time makes all the difference in life's outcomes.
- Edward Harrison was playing golf in Washington state in 1951 when his driver snapped, and <u>the</u> <u>shaft lodged in his groin</u>. He staggered about 100 yards before bleeding to death.

(2) The Unavoidable, 9:12

(a) Life's Limitations, 9:12a-b

i. Indicated, 9:12a "For man also knoweth not his time..."

• Solomon's paranoia regarding death is further exemplified in verse 12.

ii. Illustrated, 9:12b "...as the fishes that are taken in an evil net, and as the birds that are caught in the snare..."

• The path of life is full of "snares" or traps:

<u>Eph. 6:11</u> Put on the whole armour of God, that ye may be able to stand against the wiles of the devil.

<u>1 Tim. 3:6</u> Not a novice, lest being lifted up with pride he fall into the condemnation of the devil. <u>7</u> Moreover he must have a good report of them which are without; lest he fall into reproach and the snare of the devil. <u>2 Tim. 2:26</u> And *that* they may recover themselves out of the snare of the devil, who are taken captive by him at his will.

> (b) Life's Liabilities, 9:12c "...so are the sons of men **snared in an evil time**, when it falleth suddenly upon them."

<u>1 Tim. 3:7</u> Moreover he must have a good report of them which are without; lest he fall into reproach and the snare of the devil.

<u>1 Tim. 6:9</u> But they that will be rich fall into temptation and a snare, and *into* many foolish and hurtful lusts, which drown men in destruction and perdition.

Psa. 106:36 And they served their idols: which were a snare unto them.

<u>Prov. 18:7</u> A fool's mouth *is* his destruction, and his lips *are* the snare of his soul.

Prov. 29:25 The fear of man bringeth a snare: but whoso putteth his trust in the LORD shall be safe.

<u>Heb. 3:13</u> But exhort one another daily, while it is called To day; lest any of you be hardened through the deceitfulness of sin. b. The Triumph of Forgetfulness, 9:13-18
(1) The City, 9:13-15
(a) The Size of the City, 9:13-14b

i. No Outward Significance, 9:13-14a "This wisdom have I seen also under the sun, and it *seemed* great unto me: <u>14</u> *There was* a little city …"

ii. No Inward Strength, 9:14b "...and few men within it..."

 The implication is that there is a correlation between strength and masculinity – vulnerability due to "few men within it." (b) The Siege of the City, 9:14c "...and there came a great king against it, and besieged it, and built great bulwarks against it:"

 From the earthly perspective, the situation was near hopeless – "a little city...few men...a great king against it and besieged it...great bulwarks against it:"

(c) The Savior of the City, 9:15

i. Their Ignorance of Him, 9:15a "Now there was found in it a poor wise man, and he by his wisdom delivered the city;

<u>Prov. 21:22</u> A wise *man* scaleth the city of the mighty, and casteth down the strength of the confidence thereof.

"The Art of War" – Sun Tzu

ii. Their Ignoring of Him, 9:15b"...yet no man rememberedthat same poor man."

 There will be countless pastors, missionaries, and church members that the world will consider "poor" and not remember, but who are precious in the eyes of God.

Psa. 34:6 This poor man cried, and the LORD heard him, and saved him out of all his troubles.

<u>Isa. 66:2</u> For all those *things* hath mine hand made, and all those *things* have been, saith the LORD: but to this *man* will I look, *even* to *him that is* poor and of a contrite spirit, and trembleth at my word.

(2) The Cynic of the City, 9:16-18

(a) And the Despised Man, 9:16

<u>Eccl. 9:16</u> Then said I, Wisdom *is* better than strength: nevertheless the poor man's wisdom *is* despised, and his words are not heard.

 Appreciation is too often connected to "celebrity" and overlooked from humble origins.

<u>Prov. 1:5</u> A wise *man* will hear, and will increase learning; and a man of understanding shall attain unto wise counsels: <u>Prov. 24:5</u> A wise man *is* strong; yea, a man of knowledge increaseth strength.

(b) And the Deluded Man, 9:17

Eccl. 9:17 The words of wise *men are* heard in quiet more than the cry of him that ruleth among fools.

• The solitude of contemplation provides effective soul-searching of truth.

(c) And the Dangerous Man, 9:18

Eccl. 9:18 Wisdom *is* better than weapons of war: but one sinner destroyeth much good.

- Wisdom is effective when received by reasonable and responsible leaders.
- However... much good is destroyed by one sinner:
 - Judas
 - Origen
 - B. F. Westcott
 - F.J.A. Hort
 - Charles Darwin
 - Karl Marx
 - Sigmund Freud
 - Adolf Hitler (Lenin, Stalin, Mao)
 - Pope Pius XII
 - John Dewey

Conclusion
