

- Eccl. 10:1 Dead flies cause the ointment of the apothecary to send forth a stinking savour: *so doth* a little folly him that is in reputation for wisdom *and* honour.
- 2 A wise man's heart is at his right hand; but a fool's heart at his left.
- 3 Yea also, when he that is a fool walketh by the way, his wisdom faileth *him*, and he saith to every one *that* he *is* a fool.
- 4 If the spirit of the ruler rise up against thee, leave not thy place; for yielding pacifieth great offences.
- <u>5</u> There is an evil *which* I have seen under the sun, as an error *which* proceedeth from the ruler:
- 6 Folly is set in great dignity, and the rich sit in low place.
- 7 I have seen servants upon horses, and princes walking as servants upon the earth.

This evening, we continue on a wonderful, spiritual journey through the Book of Ecclesiastes, known also as "The Preacher."

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(a) The Parable of the Dead Fly, 10:1

Eccl. 10:1 Dead flies cause the ointment of the apothecary to send forth a stinking savour: so doth a little folly him that is in reputation for wisdom and honour.

A fly is a little thing, doesn't seem too significant, and is easy to overlook or take for granted.

# Gal. 5:9 A little leaven leaveneth the whole lump.

A "dead fly," though seemingly insignificant, can produce a corruption of something designed for good – ointment.

Ex. 30:25 And thou shalt make it an oil of holy ointment, an ointment compound after the art of the apothecary: it shall be an holy anointing oil.

Prov. 27:9 Ointment and perfume rejoice the heart: so *doth* the sweetness of a man's friend by hearty counsel.

- "Oil" is a type of the Holy Spirit and "...an ointment compound after the art of the apothecary: it shall be an holy anointing oil." Is an excellent type of the Holy Spirit's anointing of a believer.
- The "apothecary" is the source of the ointment. The "dead flies" are the corruption.
- One's testimony may originate from an excellent source, but a "little folly" can ruin it for one "...that is in reputation for wisdom and honour."

◆The Example of David:

2 Sam. 11:3 And David sent and enquired after the woman. And *one* said, *Is* not this Bathsheba, the daughter of Eliam, the wife of Uriah the Hittite?

1 Kings 15:5 Because David did that which was right in the eyes of the LORD, and turned not aside from any thing that he commanded him all the days of his life, save only in the matter of Uriah the Hittite.

- The Example of Josiah:
- 2 Chron. 35:21 But he sent ambassadors to him, saying, What have I to do with thee, thou king of Judah? *I come* not against thee this day, but against the house wherewith I have war: for God commanded me to make haste: **forbear thee from** *meddling with* **God**, who *is* with me, that he destroy thee not.
- 22 Nevertheless Josiah would not turn his face from him, but disguised himself, that he might fight with him, and hearkened not unto the words of Necho from the mouth of God, and came to fight in the valley of Megiddo.

  23 And the archers shot at king Josiah; and the king said to his servants, Have me away; for I am sore wounded.

The Example of Solomon:

1 Kings 4:29 And God gave Solomon wisdom and understanding exceeding much, and largeness of heart, even as the sand that *is* on the sea shore.

2 Chron. 9:22 And king Solomon passed all the kings of the earth in riches and wisdom.

23 And all the kings of the earth sought the presence of Solomon, to hear his wisdom, that God had put in his heart.

→ Perhaps, in Solomon's heart, he convinced himself that the many wives were as insignificant as flies.

1 Kings 11:4 For it came to pass, when Solomon was old, that his wives turned away his heart after other gods: and his heart was not perfect with the LORD his God, as was the heart of David his father. ...

9 And the LORD was angry with Solomon, because his heart was turned from the LORD God of Israel, which had appeared unto him twice,

Job 32:9 Great men are not *always* wise: neither do the aged understand judgment.

(b) The Parade of the Deluded Fool, 10:2-3

i. His Left-Handed Heart, 10:2

Eccl. 10:2 A wise man's heart is at his right hand; but a fool's heart at his left.

The dual nature of man, pictured here, is a constant battle for domination in making decisions.

Mt. 25:34 Then shall the King say unto them on his right hand, Come, ye blessed of my Father, inherit the kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world: ... 41 Then shall he say also unto them on the left hand, Depart from me, ye cursed, into everlasting fire, prepared for the devil and his angels:

### ii. His Loud-Voiced Herald, 10:3

Eccl. 10:3 Yea also, when he that is a fool walketh by the way, his wisdom faileth *him*, and he saith to every one *that* he *is* a fool.

Actions speak louder than words – check the fruit:

Mt. 7:20 Wherefore by their fruits ye shall know them.

A fool announces his identity by his actions.

Psa. 14:1 The fool hath said in his heart, There is no God. They are corrupt, they have done abominable works, There is none that doeth good.

Psa. 53:1 The fool hath said in his heart, *There is* no God. Corrupt are they, and have done abominable iniquity: *there is* none that doeth good.

Prov. 10:8 The wise in heart will receive commandments: but a prating fool shall fall. ...

18 He that hideth hatred with lying lips, and he that uttereth a slander, is a fool. ...

23 It is as sport to a fool to do mischief: but a man of understanding hath wisdom.

Prov. 12:15 The way of a fool *is* right in his own eyes: but he that hearkeneth unto counsel *is* wise.

Prov. 14:9 Fools make a mock at sin: but among the righteous *there is* favour.

Prov. 14:16 A wise man feareth, and departeth from evil: but the fool rageth, and is confident.

Prov. 15:5 A fool despiseth his father's instruction: but he that regardeth reproof is prudent.

Prov. 17:16 Wherefore is there a price in the hand of a fool to get wisdom, seeing he hath no heart to it?

Prov. 18:2 A fool hath no delight in understanding, but that his heart may discover itself.

Prov. 19:1 Better *is* the poor that walketh in his integrity, than *he that is* perverse in his lips, and is a fool.

<u>Prov. 20:3</u> *It is* an honour for a man to cease from strife: but every fool will be meddling.

Prov. 24:7 Wisdom is too high for a fool: he openeth not his mouth in the gate.

Prov. 26:11 As a dog returneth to his vomit, so a fool returneth to his folly.

Prov. 28:26 He that trusteth in his own heart is a fool: but whoso walketh wisely, he shall be delivered.

Prov. 29:11 A fool uttereth all his mind: but a wise man keepeth it in till afterwards.

Luke 24:25 Then he said unto them, O fools, and slow of heart to believe all that the prophets have spoken:

## **Conclusion**

- Rom. 7:15 For that which I do I allow not: for what I would, that do I not; but what I hate, that do I.

  16 If then I do that which I would not, I consent unto the law that it is good.
- 17 Now then it is no more I that do it, but sin that dwelleth in me.
- 18 For I know that in me (that is, in my flesh,) dwelleth no good thing: for to will is present with me; but how to perform that which is good I find not.

  19 For the good that I would I do not: but the evil which I would not, that I do.

- 20 Now if I do that I would not, it is no more I that do it, but sin that dwelleth in me.
- 21 I find then a law, that, when I would do good, evil is present with me.
- 22 For I delight in the law of God after the inward man:
- 23 But I see another law in my members, warring against the law of my mind, and bringing me into captivity to the law of sin which is in my members.
- 24 O wretched man that I am! who shall deliver me from the body of this death?
- <u>25</u> I thank God through Jesus Christ our Lord. So then with the mind I myself serve the law of God; but with the flesh the law of sin.
