

Mt. 5:6 Blessed *are* they which do hunger and thirst after righteousness: for they shall be filled.

Review

Several weeks ago, we began the exegesis of this great sermon preached by the Lord Jesus Christ.

- I. THE DISCIPLE AND HIS BLESSINGS, 5:1-16
 - A. The Setting, 5:1-2
 - B. The Sayings, 5:3-12
 - 1.What We Are, 5:3-5
 - a. Poor in Spirit, 5:3
 - b. Pressed in Soul, 5:4
 - c. Patient in Strife, 5:5

Tonight, we continue studying this great sermon, The Sermon on the Mount, focusing upon verse 6. Note the progression in the first four Beatitudes:

Mt. 5:3 Blessed *are* the poor in spirit: for theirs is the kingdom of heaven.

- 4 Blessed *are* they that mourn: for they shall be comforted.
- 5 Blessed are the meek: for they shall inherit the earth.
- 6 Blessed are they which do hunger and thirst after righteousness: for they shall be filled.

- Those who are "poor in spirit" and "mourn" their proclivity toward sin, become "meek" in knowing that within themselves, "self" cannot be trusted, only God can be trusted.
- The next logical step for the meek person is to focus upon life from God's perspective, to "hunger and thirst after righteousness."
 - 2. Where We Aim, 5:6

Mt. 5:6 Blessed *are* they which do hunger and thirst after righteousness: for they shall be filled.

- Mankind was created to glorify God, but most live without any concern for that purpose.
- Passion for living should be directed toward God and His perspective for mankind -> righteousness.
- Believers are to aim high:

Psa. 97:6 The heavens declare his righteousness, and all the people see his glory.

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- Matthew always uses the term "righteousness" in the sense of personal fidelity to God and His will.
- He never used it of imputed righteousness: justification.
- Therefore, the "righteousness" that the blessed "hunger and thirst for" is not salvation.
- The "righteousness" in verse 6 = personal holiness.

- When believers bewail their own "righteousnesses" (Isa. 64:6,) society's sinfulness, and pray that God will send a revival to clean things up, they demonstrate a "hunger and thirst for righteousness".
- The Lord Jesus pointed out the contrast of Scriptural righteousness vs. religious righteousness.

Mt. 5:20 For I say unto you, That except your righteousness shall exceed the righteousness of the scribes and Pharisees, ye shall in no case enter into the kingdom of heaven.

Scriptural righteousness is of national importance!

Prov. 14:34 Righteousness exalteth a nation: but sin is a reproach to any people.

 In "The Sermon on the Mount," the Lord Jesus declares His perspective on how to live a life pleasing unto God.

Mt. 5:6 Blessed *are* they which do hunger and thirst after righteousness: for they shall be filled.

Original Word: πεινάω

Transliteration: peinaó

Definition: to hunger, be hungry

Usage: I am hungry, needy, desire earnestly.

 The "secret" to spiritual growth is spiritual is cultivating a spiritual "appetite."

1 Pet. 2:2 As newborn babes, desire the sincere milk of the word, that ye may grow thereby:

Original Word: διψάω

Transliteration: dipsaó

Definition: to thirst

Usage: I thirst for, desire earnestly.

- The Lord calls those "blessed" who hunger and thirst after righteousness, not those who are already "filled" with it.
- Those thirsting "...shall be filled" is a promise of fulfillment for following His directives = obedience requiring personal discipline focused upon righteousness.

• The righteousness of Mt. 5:6 includes the judicial perspective of God's approval:

Original Word: δικαιοσύνη **Transliteration:** dikaiosuné

Definition: righteousness, justice

Usage: (usually if not always in a Jewish atmosphere), justice, justness, righteousness, righteousness of which God is the source or author, but practically: a divine righteousness.

dikaiosýnē (from δικη, "a judicial verdict") – properly, judicial approval (the verdict of approval); in the NT, the approval of God ("divine approval").

dikaiosýnē ("divine approval") is the regular NT term used for righteousness ("God's

judicial approval"). dikaiosýnē ("the approval of God") refers to what is deemed right by the Lord (after His examination), i.e. what is approved in His eyes. https://biblehub.com/greek/1343.htm

- To "hunger and thirst" indicates an intensified desire or longing – like going from "hungry" to "starving."
- The Prodigal son, when "hungry" ate "husks" and was not filled. When he "starved," he found satisfaction in fellowship with his father.

Mt. 6:33 But seek ye first the kingdom of God, and his righteousness; and all these things shall be added unto you.

Prov. 21:21 He that followeth after righteousness and mercy findeth life, righteousness, and honour.

Consider the example of Moses:

Ex. 33:13 Now therefore, I pray thee, if I have found grace in thy sight, shew me now thy way, that I may know thee, that I may find grace in thy sight: and consider that this nation is thy people.

18 And he said, I beseech thee, shew me thy glory. ... 22 And it shall come to pass, while my glory passeth by, that I will put thee in a clift of the rock, and will cover thee with my hand while I pass by:

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David exhibited an appetite or thirst for God:

Psa. 42:1 As the hart panteth after the water brooks, so panteth my soul after thee, O God.

2 My soul thirsteth for God, for the living God: when shall I come and appear before God?

 The Apostle Paul was hungry and thirsty for the Lord:

Phil. 3:10 That I may know him, and the power of his resurrection, and the fellowship of his sufferings, being made conformable unto his death;

14 I press toward the mark for the prize of the high calling of God in Christ Jesus.

- Besides <u>1 Pet. 2:2</u>, Peter expressed his desire to "grow in grace:"
- 2 Pet. 3:18 But grow in grace, and in the knowledge of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ. To him be glory both now and for ever. Amen.
- Loss of spiritual appetite leads to backsliding, dormancy, and apostasy.
- Heb. 5:12 For when for the time ye ought to be teachers, ye have need that one teach you again which be the first principles of the oracles of God; and are become such as have need of milk, and not of strong meat.
- 13 For every one that useth milk is unskilful in the word of righteousness: for he is a babe.
- 14 But strong meat belongeth to them that are of full age, even those who by reason of use have their senses exercised to discern both good and evil.

 The purpose for hungering and thirsting after His righteousness is to be like Christ:

Rom. 8:28 And we know that all things work together for good to them that love God, to them who are the called according to *his* purpose.

29 For whom he did foreknow, he also did predestinate *to be* conformed to the image of his Son, that he might be the firstborn among many brethren.

 A believer's pursuit after God and His righteousness has a special promise: "...for they shall be filled." Remember Israel's lack of faith in the wilderness regarding God's power and provision:

Psa. 78:18 And they tempted God in their heart by asking meat for their lust.

19 Yea, they spake against God; they said, Can God Jurnish a table in the wilderness?

Original Word: χορτάζω

Transliteration: chortazó

Definition: to feed, fatten, fill, satisfy

Usage: I feed, satisfy, fatten.

Mark 8:4 And his disciples answered him, From whence can a man satisfy these *men* with bread here in the wilderness? ...

8 So they did eat, and were filled: and they took up of the broken *meat* that was left seven baskets.

 Before a believer is totally "filled" and satisfied with Christ, there must first be the "hungering" and "thirsting" after Him:

Mt. 5:6 Blessed *are* they which do hunger and thirst after righteousness: for they shall be filled.

 There is a great day coming when believers will be "filled," and blessed, with complete happiness and satisfaction, in eternal fellowship with the Lord Jesus Christ!

Rev. 7:15 Therefore are they before the throne of God, and serve him day and night in his temple: and he that sitteth on the throne shall dwell among them. 16 They shall hunger no more, neither thirst any more; neither shall the sun light on them, nor any heat.

17 For the Lamb which is in the midst of the throne shall feed them, and shall lead them unto living fountains of waters: and God shall wipe away all tears from their eyes.

Conclusion

- Psa. 63:1 O God, thou art my God; early will I seek thee: my soul thirsteth for thee, my flesh longeth for thee in a dry and thirsty land, where no water is;
- 2 To see thy power and thy glory, so as I have seen thee in the sanctuary.
- 3 Because thy lovingkindness is better than life, my lips shall praise thee.
- 4 Thus will I bless thee while I live: I will lift up my hands in thy name.
- 5 My soul shall be satisfied as with marrow and fatness; and my mouth shall praise thee with joyful lips:
- 6 When I remember thee upon my bed, and meditate on thee in the *night* watches.
