Early in the "Sermon on the Mount" the Lord Jesus emphasized His concern regarding "righteousness."

Mt. 5:20 For I say unto you, That except your righteousness shall exceed *the righteousness* of the scribes and Pharisees, ye shall in no case enter into the kingdom of heaven.

The passage tonight is most relevant for 2021, regarding moral purity and God's plan for intimate relationship between a man and a woman. God revealed His plan in <u>Gen. 2:18-25</u>:

Gen. 2:18 And the LORD God said, It is not good that the man should be alone; I will make him an help meet for him. 21 And the LORD God caused a deep sleep to fall upon Adam, and he slept: and he took one of his ribs, and closed up the flesh instead thereof; 22 And the rib, which the LORD God had taken from man, made he a woman, and brought her unto the man. 23 And Adam said, This is now bone of my bones, and flesh of my flesh: she shall be called Woman, because she was taken out of Man. 24 Therefore shall a man leave his father and his mother, and shall cleave unto his wife: and they shall be one flesh. 25 And they were both naked, the man and his wife, and were not ashamed.

<u>Heb. 13:4</u> Marriage *is* honourable in all, and the bed undefiled: but whoremongers and adulterers God will judge.

<u>1 Cor. 7:2</u> Nevertheless, *to avoid* fornication, let every man have his own wife, and let every woman have her own husband.

 God's institution of the home has been under attack since <u>Gen. 4:19</u>:

<u>Gen 4:19</u> And Lamech took unto him two wives: the name of the one *was* Adah, and the name of the other Zillah.

C. The Question of Indulging Lust, 5:27-32

1. A Defiled Marriage, 5:27-30

a. God's Condemning Law, 5:27

Mt. 5:27 Ye have heard that it was said by them of old time, Thou shalt not commit adultery:

 Jesus referred to the seventh commandment in Ex. 20:14, Deut. 5:18:

Ex. 20:14 Thou shalt not commit adultery.

b. Man's Corrupting Lust, 5:28-30

(1) A Wrong Look, 5:28

Mt. 5:28 Aut I say unto you, That whosoever looketh on a woman to lust after her hath committed adultery with her already in his heart.

Original Word: γυνή Transliteration: guné Definition: a woman (gynecology) Usage: a woman, wife, my lady

 The Greek word gyn can mean either "wife" or "woman." Certainly the spirit of the command would prohibit *lusting after any woman*, not just a married woman.

 While addressing "righteousness," Jesus elevated His standard against sin as originating in the heart…"hath committed adultery with her already in his heart."

 Both Old and New Testament Scriptures emphasizes the need to guard the heart: <u>1 Sam. 16:7</u> But the LORD said unto Samuel, Look not on his countenance, or on the height of his stature; because I have refused him: for the LORD seeth not as man seeth; for man looketh on the outward appearance, but the LORD looketh on the heart.

<u>Prov. 4:23</u> Keep thy heart with all diligence; for out of it *are* the issues of life.

<u>Mt. 15:19</u> For out of the heart proceed evil thoughts, murders, adulteries, fornications, thefts, false witness, blasphemies: The oldest book in the Bible indicates that men have a perpetual problem regarding the "lust of the eyes."

Job 31:1 I made a covenant with mine eyes; why then should I think upon a maid?
2 For what portion of God *is there* from above? and *what* inheritance of the Almighty from on high?
3 Is not destruction to the wicked? and a strange *punishment* to the workers of iniquity?
4 Doth not he see my ways, and count all my steps?

 When the "seeing" leads to "thinking upon," lust is ignited within a man's heart.

Jas. 1:14 But every man is tempted, when he is drawn away of his own lust, and enticed. 15 Then when lust hath conceived, it bringeth forth sin: and sin, when it is finished, bringeth forth death.

Summary of Mt. 5:28:

 Jesus proceeded to clarify God's intended meaning in the seventh commandment (Ex. 20:14; Deut. 5:18).

The rabbis in Jesus' day tended to look at "adultery" as wrong because it involved stealing another man's wife. They viewed it as an external act.

 Jesus, on the other hand, saw it as wrong because it made the lustful individual impure morally, an internal condition, originating in the heart. Fantasized immorality, with or without the use of pornographic material, is just as sinful to God as physical immorality.

 The fact that fornication that takes place in the brain has fewer bad consequences than fornication that takes place on a bed does not mitigate this truth.

 A man who gazes at a woman with the purpose of wanting her sexually has mentally committed adultery. <u>Prov. 6:25</u> Lust not after her beauty in thine heart; neither let her take thee with her eyelids.

<u>2 Pet. 2:14</u> Having eyes full of adultery, and that cannot cease from sin; beguiling unstable souls: an heart they have exercised with covetous practices; cursed children:

 Does lustful looking from men excuse women from all responsibility of allurement?

<u>1 Tim. 2:9</u> In like manner also, that women adorn themselves in modest apparel, with shamefacedness and sobriety; not with broided hair, or gold, or pearls, or costly array; Modesty is the outward expression of inner purity. Bill G. Marshall https://www.facebook.com/bill.g.marshall

Ezek. 23:40 And furthermore, that ye have sent for men to come from far, unto whom a messenger was sent; and, lo, they came: for whom thou didst wash hyself, paintedst thy eyes, and deckedst thyself with ornaments,

 Women of questionable character prey upon men's fleshly weakness.

<u>Prov. 6:26</u> For by means of a whorish woman *a man* is brought to a piece of bread: and the adulteress will hunt for the precious life.

Consider David, known as "a man after God's own heart." (<u>1 Sam. 13:14, Acts 13:22</u>)

2 Sam. 11:2 And it came to pass in an eveningtide, that David arose from off his bed, and walked upon the roof of the king's house: and from the roof he saw a woman washing herself; and the woman was very beautiful to look upon. 4 And David sent messengers, and took her; and she came in unto him, and he lay with her; for she was purified from her uncleanness: and she returned unto her house.

 David was wrong. Whether or not Bathsheba was complicit, the situation created much heartache and confusion.

Job 31:1 I made a covenant with mine eyes; why then should I think upon a maid?

<u>2 Pet. 2:12</u> But these, as natural brute beasts, made to be taken and destroyed, speak evil of the things that they understand not; and shall utterly perish in their own corruption;
