

Song 5:10 My beloved *is* white and ruddy, the chiefest among ten thousand. 11 His head is as the most fine gold, his locks are bushy, and black as a raven. 12 His eyes are as the eyes of doves by the rivers of waters, washed with milk, and fitly set. 13 His cheeks *are* as a bed of spices, *as* sweet flowers: his lips *like* lilies, dropping sweet smelling myrrh. 14 His hands are as gold rings set with the beryl: his belly is as bright ivory overlaid with sapphires. 15 His legs are as pillars of marble, set upon sockets of fine gold: his countenance is as Lebanon, excellent as the cedars. <u>16</u> His mouth *is* most sweet: yea, he *is* altogether lovely. This is my beloved, and this is my friend, O daughters of Jerusalem.

Tonight we continue the exegesis of this wonderful book as we return to the beginning of chapter five, to consider...

Tonight, we consider "The Description of the Beloved" in <u>Song of Sol. 5:10-16</u>.

• Here is the answer to the question in <u>Song 5:9</u>:

<u>9</u> What *is* thy beloved more than *another* beloved, O thou fairest among women? what *is* thy beloved more than *another* beloved, that thou dost so charge us?

• The Shulammite loved Solomon very much, as is clear from her description of him here.

 The comparisons illustrate his value and attractiveness to her, more than just giving us a picture of his actual physical appearance.

 These verses show that a woman has the right to enjoy her husband's body.

<u>1 Cor. 7:4</u> The wife hath not power of her own body, but the husband: and likewise also the husband hath not power of his own body, but the wife. Normally, a person finds the erotic ultimately meaningful only if there is trust and commitment, delight in the other's person as well as in the body.

 The physical display of love, within God's boundary of matrimony, is the ultimate engagement of vulnerability, giving of oneself totally unto another.

<u>Heb. 13:4</u> Marriage *is* honourable in all, and the bed undefiled: but whoremongers and adulterers God will judge. B. The Description of the Beloved, 5:10-16

1. His Purity, 5:10a "My beloved *is* white and ruddy..."

- The "Beloved" was Jewish, his complexion was whitish brown – like Adam, or a native American.
- The "white" color is a symbol for purity and "ruddy" is a picture of the "earthy."
- The combination of "white and ruddy" is symbolical of the Lord Jesus Christ the theanthropic personage, or hypostatic union as the "God-man."

2. His Position, 5:10b "...the chiefest among ten thousand."

The "Beloved" is the "best of the best!"

Col. 1:16 For by him were all things created, that are in heaven, and that are in earth, visible and invisible, whether they be thrones, or dominions, or principalities, or powers: all things were created by him, and for him: 17 And he is before all things, and by him all things consist. 18 And he is the head of the body, the church: who is the beginning, the firstborn from the dead; that in all things he might have the preeminence.

3. His Person, 5:11-16

a. His Sovereignty, 5:11a "His head *is as* the most fine gold..."

Gold is symbolical of a king, reigning over His domain.

b. His Strength, 5:11b "...his locks are bushy, and black as a raven."

As a Jewish man, His hair was "black as a raven." His hands were rugged as a carpenter.

c. His Sight, 5:12

<u>Song 5:12</u> His eyes *are* as *the eyes* of doves by the rivers of waters, washed with milk, *and* fitly set.

 His eyes were apparently moist and sparkling, rather than dry and staring.

 Doves are gray, sparkling like "the rivers of waters," brightly white like "milk," and "fitly set" like a piece of jewelry (not "beady" like a criminal.)

Hab. 1:13a "Thou art of purer eyes than to behold evil, and canst not look on iniquity..."

d. His Sweetness, 5:13a "His cheeks *are* as a bed of spices, *as* sweet flowers..."

 The "Beloved" has a natural "blush" of innocent attractiveness.

e. His Sayings, 5:13b "...his lips *like* lilies, dropping sweet smelling myrrh."

 The words of the "Beloved" are precious to those who love Him!

<u>Prov. 8:6</u> Hear; for I will speak of excellent things; and the opening of my lips *shall be* right things. f. His Skill, 5:14a "His hands *are as* gold rings set with the beryl..."

When comparing <u>Ex. 39:13-16; Heb. 3:1</u>, it appears that a combination of gold rings and beryl is a picture of physical beauty and wealth which also are also symbols of sonship and authority that represents the "Beloved" as *High Priest*.

g. His Substance, 5:14b "...his belly *is as* bright ivory overlaid *with* sapphires."

 The "bright ivory" is a bright white which represents strength, royalty, luxury, and wealth. The sapphires speak of the "Bridegroom's" attractiveness.

> h. His Stand, 5:15a "His legs *are as* pillars of marble, set upon sockets of fine gold..."

The "legs" represent strength and the "marble" represents endurance, while the "sockets of fine gold" symbolize His deity.

i. His Splendor, 5:15b "...his countenance is as Lebanon, excellent as the cedars."

 His "countenance is as Lebanon, excellent as the cedars" represent strength and steadfastness.

j. His Smile, 5:16

<u>Song 5:16</u> His mouth *is* most sweet: yea, he *is* **altogether lovely**. This *is* my beloved, and this *is* my friend, O daughters of Jerusalem.

The captivation of the bride's heart is multifaceted:

 "His mouth *is* most sweet" – it is a joy to hear His voice!

Psa. 119:103 How sweet are thy words unto my taste! yea, sweeter than honey to my mouth!

 "yea, he is altogether lovely" – everything about Him is precious!

<u>1 Pet. 2:7a</u> Unto you therefore which believe he is precious..."

"This is my beloved, and this is my friend..." –
 we have a very close relationship!

<u>1 Cor. 16:22</u> If any man love not the Lord Jesus Christ, let him be Anathema Maranatha.

Conclusion

Psa. 19:7 The law of the LORD is perfect, converting the soul: the testimony of the LORD is sure, making wise the simple. 8 The statutes of the LORD are right, rejoicing the heart: the commandment of the LORD is pure, enlightening the eyes. 9 The fear of the LORD is clean, enduring for ever: the judgments of the LORD are true and righteous altogether. 10 More to be desired are they than gold, yea, than much fine gold: sweeter also than honey and the honeycomb.
