After salvation, a spiritually healthy believer grows in grace to understand the value of Scripture, which in turn produces sanctification. Sanctification leads to a spiritual separation. This morning, we continue in chapter two that explains why separation is normal for a believer.

- B. Its Reasons, 2:2-11
 - 1. Separation by Birth from the Old Life, 2:2-3
 - a. A New Status Described, 2:2a—b
 - (1) A Babe and Its New Life, 2:2a "As newborn babes..."

- Healthy babies have healthy appetites, exhibiting the craving for milk = natural desire.
 - (2) A Babe and Its Natural Longings, 2:2b "...desire the sincere milk of the word..."
- Believers are commanded to hunger and crave after the Word of God like the babies crave milk = normal focus with personal ramifications for growth.

Original Word: ἐπιποθέω

Part of Speech: Verb – Aorist Imp. Act.

Transliteration: epipotheó

Definition: to long for

Usage: I long for, strain after, desire greatly, have affection

for.

epipothéō – properly, to long for, especially as it is fitting (apt)

 The focus of the believer's yearning is for the "sincere" milk which is the opposite of the "guile" mentioned in verse 1. Original Word: ἄδολος

Transliteration: adolos

Definition: guileless, genuine = sincere

Usage: unadulterated, pure, guileless.

ádolos (an adjective, derived from A "without" and dólos, "bait, deceit") — properly, not-caught (in a trap), referring to being free from fraud (trickery, deceit); without craftiness (hidden, "mixed motives").

 Obedient "feeding" of the sincere milk of the Word results in spiritual growth! The "feeding" should begin with godly parents who teach the Word of God consistently within the home.

<u>Deut. 6:4</u> Hear, O Israel: The LORD our God is one LORD: <u>5</u> And thou shalt love the LORD thy God with all thine heart, and with all thy soul, and with all thy might. <u>6</u> And these words, which I command thee this day, shall be in thine heart:

- 7 And thou shalt teach them all gently unto thy children, and shalt talk of them when thou sittest in thine house, and when thou walkest by the way, and when thou liest down, and when thou risest up.
- 8 And thou shalt bind them for a sign upon thine hand, and they shall be as frontlets between thine eyes.
 9 And thou shalt write them upon the posts of thy house, and on thy gates.

- The idea is to keep a constant awareness of the Word of God in daily life.
- Such "feeding" is supplemented in a local church through Sunday school and church.
 - b. A New Stature Desired, 2:2c—3
 - (1) Growth Unstunted, 2:2c "...that ye may grow thereby:"

2 Pet. 3:17 Ye therefore, beloved, seeing ye know these things before, beware lest ye also, being led away with the error of the wicked, fall from your own stedfastness.

18 But grow in grace, and in the knowledge of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ. To him *be* glory both now and for ever. Amen.

(2) Grace Unstinted, 2:3

1 Pet. 2:3 If so be ye have tasted that the Lord is gracious.

Original Word: εἰ

Part of Speech: Conditional Particle Or Conjunction

Transliteration: ei

Definition: for a smuch as, if, that

Usage: if.

ei (a conditional conjunction) — if. ei (followed by any verb) expresses "a condition, thought of as real, or to denote assumptions" (i.e. viewed as factual. for the sake of argument) (BAGD). Accordingly, (ei) should not be translated "since," but rather always "if" — since the assumption may only be portrayed as valid (true, factual).

"If so be" = a conditional perspective → if a person is genuinely "born again," the ramification will be seen via spiritual growth.

Original Word: γεύομαι

Transliteration: geuomai

Definition: to taste, eat

Usage: (a) I taste, (b) I experience.

- One who has "tasted that the Lord is gracious" will exhibit a changed life.
- The "taste" of graciousness creates an "appetite" for more!

Original Word: χρηστός

Transliteration: chréstos

Definition: serviceable, good, gracious

Usage: useful, gentle, pleasant, kind.


xrēstós - well-fitted (well-resourced); useful (beneficial, benevolent).

On the spiritual plane, xrēstós ("suitable, usefully kind") describes what God defines is kind — and therefore also eternally useful! "We have no adjective in English that conveys this blend of being kind and good at the same time" (M. Vincent). https://biblehub.com/greek/5543.htm

As a believer grows in grace, so does an appreciation, or appetite, for God's Word and such grace will continue producing spiritual nourishment, plus a desire to continue having a heathy, spiritual life of godly growth, a growing, spiritual appetite to please God.

Conclusion

- Isa. 28:9 Whom shall he teach knowledge? and whom shall he make to understand doctrine? them that are weaned from the milk, and drawn from the breasts.
- 10 For precept must be upon precept, precept upon precept; line upon line, line upon line; here a little, and there a little:
- 11 For with stammering lips and another tongue will he speak to this people.
- 12 To whom he said, This *is* the rest *wherewith* ye may cause the weary to rest; and this *is* the refreshing: yet they would not hear.



Heb 5:12 For when for the time ye ought to be teachers, ye have need that one teach you again which *be* the first principles of the oracles of God; and are become such as have need of milk, and not of strong meat.

- 13 For every one that useth milk is unskilful in the word of righteousness: for he is a babe.
- 14 But strong meat belongeth to them that are of full age, even those who by reason of use have their senses exercised to discern both good and evil.
