

# LOVE SO AMAZING

**2022 THEME** 

<u>1 Cor. 12:31</u> But covet earnestly the best gifts: and yet shew I unto you a more excellent way.

<u>1 Cor. 13:4</u> Charity suffereth long, *and* is kind; charity envieth not; charity vaunteth not itself, is not puffed up,

<u>5</u> Doth not behave itself unseemly, seeketh not her own, is not easily provoked, thinketh no evil;
<u>6</u> Rejoiceth not in iniquity, but rejoiceth in the truth;
<u>7</u> Beareth all things, believeth all things, hopeth all things, endureth all things.

This morning, we continue looking at *Love So Amazing* in what is commonly called the "Love Chapter," <u>I Cor. 13</u>. We began with examining the usage of "charity" instead of "love" as the translation of the Greek work *agape*.

The basic observation regarding the two words is that the translation of *agape* to *love* is focused upon the attribute of God while translating *agape* to *charity* focuses upon a believers interaction with others. <u>2 Thess. 1:3</u> We are bound to thank God always for you, brethren, as it is meet, because that your faith groweth exceedingly, and the charity of every one of you all toward each other aboundeth;

<u>1 Pet. 4:8</u> And above all things have fervent charity among yourselves: for charity shall cover the multitude of sins.

# As we continue the "Love So Amazing" chapter, remember that the focus of the word charity emphasizes God-like love of a believer toward others.

The chapter begins by expressing great things that are nullified without charity.

## I. THE EXCLUSION OF CHARITY, 13:1-3

- A. Skill Without Charity Is Commotion, 13:1
- B. Spirituality Without Charity Is Conceitedness, 13:2
- C. Sacrifice Without Charity Is Contemptible, 13:3
- In essence, the first three verses are expressing THE VALUE OF LOVE.

#### II. THE EXPLANATION OF CHARITY, 13:4-8

- The next few verses are expressing THE VIRTUE OF LOVE. Last week we observed The Patience of Charity, expressing humility.
  - A. The Patience of Charity, 13:4

<u>1 Cor. 13:4</u> Charity suffereth long, *and* is kind; charity envieth not; charity vaunteth not itself, is not puffed up,

<u>1 Cor. 13:4</u> "The Humble Perspective"  $\rightarrow$  Humility

This morning, we continue to observe the positive explanation of charity and how it is manifested toward others.

B. The Peace of Charity, 13:5

<u>1 Cor. 13:5</u> Doth not behave itself unseemly, seeketh not her own, is not easily provoked, thinketh no evil;

<u>1 Cor. 13:5</u> "The Unselfish Perspective" → Harmlessness

"Charity doth not behave itself unseemly,"

- **Original Word:** ἀσχημονέω **Transliteration:** aschémoneó **Definition:** to act unbecomingly **Usage:** I act improperly, am unseemly, behave unbecomingly (or even dishonorably); perhaps: I consider (something) unseemly.
- *asxēmonéō* to act unseemly (literally, "improperly"); (figuratively) to lack proper form and hence thought of as unseemly (indecent, unbecoming).

- Being obnoxious for Jesus" just doesn't fit this verse!
- Interrupting services at a heretical church or cult is "unseemly."
- Charity is courteous and polite, considerate of another's feelings.
- Charity does not make excuses for being rude or caustic "I'm a redhead, Irish, etc."

"Charity seeketh not her own,"

- **Original Word:** ζητέω **Transliteration:** zéteó **Definition:** to seek; **Usage:** I seek, search for, desire, require, demand.
- zētéō properly, to seek by inquiring; to investigate to reach a binding (terminal) resolution; to search, "getting to the bottom of a matter."

- A believer is NOT constantly promoting self and seeking his/her "rights."
- Charity is not self-centered, but more concerned about promoting others than promoting self.

"Charity is not easily provoked,"

**Original Word:** παροξύνω **Transliteration:** paroxunó **Definition:** to sharpen, to stimulate, to provoke; **Usage:** I

arouse anger, provoke, irritate.

*paroksýnō* – properly, cut close alongside, i.e. **to incite** ("jab") someone and stimulate their feelings (emotions); "become emotionally provoked (upset, roused to anger)" (A-S), as personally "getting to someone"; (figuratively) "to provoke feelings, spurring someone to action" (Souter).

A believer in fellowship with Christ does NOT get easily provoked.

Psa. 119:165 Great peace have they which love thy law: and nothing shall offend them.

Charity does stifles the overly sensitive person who is wearing their feelings on their shirt sleeves.

"Charity thinketh no evil;"

**Original Word:** λογίζομαι **Transliteration:** logizomai **Definition:** to reckon, to consider **Usage:** I reckon, count, charge with; reason, decide, conclude; think, suppose.

*logízomai* (the root of the English terms "*logic, logical*") – properly, *compute,* "take into account"; *reckon* (come to a "bottom-line"), i.e. *reason* to a *logical conclusion*(decision). https://biblehub.com/greek/3049.htm

- "Thinketh no evil" can apply toward others, or personally toward self, regarding circumstances.
- Charity does NOT keep a record of offenses.
- Delete the file on those who have offended you and forget about retaliation.

**Original Word:** κακός **Transliteration:** kakos **Definition:** bad, evil; **Usage:** bad, evil, in the widest sense.

kakós (an adjective, and the root of kakía, "inner malice") – properly, inwardly foul, rotten (poisoned); (figuratively) inner malice flowing out of a morallyrotten character (= the "rot is already in the wood").

[*kakós* is often a pronominal adjective (i.e. used as a substantive) meaning, "wickedness, inner evil."]

- Personally, a believer in fellowship with Christ does NOT ask the question, "Why did God allow this to happen to me?"
- A believer in fellowship with Christ does NOT ask the question, "Why didn't I get to

- A believer in fellowship with Christ does NOT surmise of questionable motives of others.
- Prov. 10:12 Hatred stirreth up strifes: but love covereth all sins.

#### <u>Summary</u>

We began with THE VALUE OF LOVE and have continued observing the first couple of verses regarding THE VIRTUE OF LOVE:

<u>1 Cor. 13:4</u> "The Humble Perspective"  $\rightarrow$  Humility

<u>1 Cor. 13:5</u> "The Unselfish Perspective" → Harmlessness Charity doth not behave itself unseemly, = unassuming Charity seeketh not her own, = unselfish Charity is not easily provoked, = unpretentious Charity thinketh no evil; = unpresumptuous

### <u>Conclusion</u>

<u>1 Pet. 4:7</u> But the end of all things is at hand: be ye therefore sober, and watch unto prayer.

- <u>8</u> And above all things have fervent charity among yourselves: for charity shall cover the multitude of sins.
- <u>9</u> Use hospitality one to another without grudging.
