

GRACE SO AMAZING TO THE HUMBLE <u>1 Pet. 5:11-12</u>

- <u>1 Pet. 5:5</u> Likewise, ye younger, submit yourselves unto the elder. Yea, all of you be subject one to another, and be clothed with humility: for God resisteth the proud, and giveth grace to the humble.
- <u>6</u> Humble yourselves therefore under the mighty hand of God, that he may exalt you in due time:
- 7 Casting all your care upon him; for he careth for you. 8 Be sober, be vigilant; because your adversary the devil, as a roaring lion, walketh about, seeking whom he may devour: 9 Whom resist stedfast in the faith, knowing that the same afflictions are accomplished in your brethren that are in the world.
- <u>10</u> But the God of all grace, who hath called us unto his eternal glory by Christ Jesus, after that ye have suffered a while, make you perfect, stablish, strengthen, settle you.
 <u>11</u> To him be glory and dominion for ever and ever. Amen.

The last few weeks we have observed how *Grace So Amazing* was connected with believers who "Humble yourselves therefore under the mighty hand of God..." in <u>I Pet. 5:5-6</u>:

<u>1 Pet. 5:6</u> Humble yourselves therefore under the mighty hand of God, that he may exalt you in due time:

Basically, humility is THE ROLE OF THE SHEEP, being wholly dependent upon the Lord.

The passage goes from encouraging the sheep to humility, to warning about the destructive desire of the devil. Sheep, without the Shepherd, are vulnerable to the devouring of the devilish lion. Believers are taught how to defend themselves. In doing so, the passage guides believers in the way to winning the battle over the roaring lion, our adversary.

- The command to be humble, sober, vigilant and to resist the devil is for all believers, in every place around the world.
- Following the orders from the Captain of our Salvation will lead us to "Winning Over the Roaring Lion."

B. Winning Over the Roaring Lion, 5:10-11

1. God and His Grace, 5:10a "But the God of all grace..."

Whatever a believer needs to live victoriously in this present world, God's grace is sufficient.

<u>2 Tim. 1:12</u> For the which cause I also suffer these things: nevertheless I am not ashamed: for I know whom I have believed, and am persuaded that **he is able** to keep that which I have committed unto him against that day.

<u>Heb. 7:25</u> Wherefore **he is able** also to save them to the uttermost that come unto God by him, seeing he ever liveth to make intercession for them.

<u>2 Cor. 8:7</u> Therefore, as ye abound in every *thing, in* faith, and utterance, and knowledge, and *in* all diligence, and *in* your love to us, *see that ye* **abound in this grace also**.

<u>Eph. 3:20</u> Now unto him that is able to do exceeding abundantly above all that we ask or think, according to the power that worketh in us, <u>2 Cor. 12:9</u> And he said unto me, **My grace is sufficient for thee**: for my strength is made perfect in weakness. Most gladly therefore will I rather glory in my infirmities, that **the power of Christ** may rest upon me.

A believer's life is for God's glory, and He is the enabler toward that end.

Phil. 2:13 For it is God which worketh in you both to will and to do of *his* good pleasure.

2. God and His Goal, 5:10b-c

a. The Process, 5:10b "...who hath called us unto his eternal glory by Christ Jesus after that ye have suffered a while..."

Believers are "in the view of" the Lord's eternal glory.

- <u>2 Cor. 4:16</u> For which cause we faint not; but though our outward man perish, yet the inward *man* is renewed day by day.
- <u>17</u> For our light affliction, which is but for a moment, worketh for us a far more exceeding *and* eternal weight of glory;
- <u>18</u> While we look not at the things which are seen, but at the things which are not seen: for the things which are seen *are* temporal; but the things which are not seen *are* eternal.

The "sufferings" are only temporary, "a while."

Original Word: πάθημα **Transliteration:** pathéma **Definition:** that which befalls one, a suffering, a passion **Usage:** (a) **suffering**, affliction, (b) passion, emotion, (c) an undergoing, an enduring.

Under God, *páthēma* ("strong feeling") is *redemptive*, **preparing us to** *know the Lord* **better now and** *forever in glory* (cf. Ro 8:18; Phil 3:10; 1 Pet 5:1).

[*páthēma* ("strong feeling") includes affliction (suffering), which should always (ideally) *result* in knowing God's *glory* – like going through difficulties (persecution, etc.) in *faith*. <u>Rom. 8:18</u> For I reckon that the sufferings of this present time *are* not worthy *to be compared* with the glory which shall be revealed in us.

b. The Prospect, 5:10c "...make you perfect, stablish, strengthen, settle you."

The Lord, like a sculptor, is actively involved in a believer's life to mold and shape into a masterpiece of discipleship, for His glory. **Original Word:** καταρτίζω **Transliteration:** katartizó **Definition:** to complete, prepare **Usage:** (a) I fit (join) together; met: I compact together, (b) I prepare, **perfect**, for his (its) full destination or use, bring into its proper condition (whether for the first time, or after a lapse).

katartízō – properly, exactly fit (adjust) to be in good working order, i.e. adjusted exactly "down" to fully function. https://biblehub.com/greek/2675.htm I. to render, i.e. to fit, sound, complete

- A. to mend (what has been broken or rent), to repair to complete
- B. to fit out, equip, put in order, arrange, adjust to fit or frame for one's self, prepare
- C. ethically: to strengthen, perfect, complete, make one what he ought to be

<u>Mt. 4:21</u> And going on from thence, he saw other two brethren, James *the son* of Zebedee, and John his brother, in a ship with Zebedee their father, **mending** their nets; and he called them. (<u>Mark</u> <u>1:19</u>) <u>Gal. 6:1</u> Brethren, if a man be overtaken in a fault, ye which are spiritual, **restore** such an one in the spirit of meekness; considering thyself, lest thou also be tempted.

<u>Heb. 11:3</u> Through faith we understand that the worlds were **framed** by the word of God, so that things which are seen were not made of things which do appear.

The "suffering" is to "make you perfect," to fulfill the purpose for a believer's "path to progress," it is to "make one what he ought to be." **Original Word:** στηρίζω **Transliteration:** stérizó **Definition:** to make fast, establish (**stablish**) **Usage:** (a) I fix firmly, direct myself towards, (b) generally met: I buttress, prop, support; I strengthen, establish.

stērízō – properly, set fast (fix); give *support to secure* (firmly establish); solidly plant (which eliminates vacillation). <u>https://biblehub.com/greek/4741.htm</u> To "stablish" is to create stability to stand firm during the believer's storms of life.

Original Word: σθενόω **Transliteration:** sthenoó **Definition:** to strengthen **Usage:** I strengthen.

Sthenóō (from sthenos, "strength") – properly, make strong so as to be mobile – i.e. able to move in a way that achieves something in the most effective way.

As the believer remains steadfast in the faith, the goal is not rigidity, but strength for flexibility, able to bend but not break.

Original Word: θεμελιόω **Transliteration:** themelioó **Definition:** to lay the foundation of **Usage: I found, lay the foundation** (lit. and met.).

To be settled is to have a firm foundation in the faith, not wavering.

3. God and His Glory, 5:11

<u>1 Pet. 5:11</u> To him *be* glory and dominion for ever and ever. Amen.

The ultimate goal for a believer is to live a life that will "make you perfect, stablish, strengthen, settle you." – for God's glory throughout eternity!

<u>9</u> He hath dispersed, he hath given to the poor; his righteousness endureth for ever; his horn shall be exalted with honour.
