Tonight, we finish <u>Gen. 47</u>, which is the beginning of the conclusion of *The Patriarchal History* regarding Jacob and Joseph. We then begin chapter 48 with the last days of Jacob.

E. The Conclusion, 47:27—50:26

1. The Death of Jacob, 47:27—50:21

a. Jacob's Foreknowledge, 47:27—49:27

(1) The Chosen Favorite, 47:27—48:22

(a) Jacob's Burial, 47:27-31

- Gen. 47:27 And Israel dwelt in the land of Egypt, in the country of Goshen; and they had possessions therein, and grew, and multiplied exceedingly.
- 28 And Jacob lived in the land of Egypt seventeen years: so the whole age of Jacob was an hundred forty and seven years. 29 And the time drew nigh that Israel must die: and he called his son Joseph, and said unto him, If now I have found grace in thy sight, put, I pray thee, thy hand under my thigh, and deal kindly and truly with me; bury me not, I pray thee, in Egypt:
- 30 But I will lie with my fathers, and thou shalt carry me out of Egypt, and bury me in their buryingplace. And he said, I will do as thou hast said.
- 31 And he said, Swear unto me. And he sware unto him. And Israel bowed himself upon the bed's head.

- Typical oriental chronology: Jacob's death and his age are given and THEN details are given that took place before his death.
- During the last seventeen years, (v. 27), "...in the country of Goshen; and they had possessions therein, and grew, and multiplied exceedingly."

Ex. 12:37 And the children of Israel journeyed from Rameses to Succoth, about six hundred thousand on foot *that were* men, beside children.

- Jacob, at 147 years old (v. 28), like Abraham with Eliezer in finding a bride for Isaac, has Joseph swear to bury him at Machpelah.
- Gen. 24:1 And Abraham was old, and well stricken in age: and the LORD had blessed Abraham in all things.
- 2 And Abraham said unto his eldest servant of his house, that ruled over all that he had, Put, I pray thee, thy hand under my thigh:
- 3 And I will make thee swear by the LORD, the God of heaven, and the God of the earth, that thou shalt not take a wife unto my son of the daughters of the Canaanites, among whom I dwell:
- 4 But thou shalt go unto my country, and to my kindred, and take a wife unto my son Isaac.

Gen. 49:29 And he charged them, and said unto them, I am to be gathered unto my people: bury me with my fathers in the cave that is in the field of Ephron the Hittite, 30 In the cave that is in the field of Machpelah, which is before Mamre, in the land of Canaan, which Abraham bought with the field of Ephron the Hittite for a possession of a buryingplace.


31 There they buried Abraham and Sarah his wife; there they buried Isaac and Rebekah his wife; and there I buried Leah.

- Joseph swears to follow his father's desire (v. 31.)
- Note the use of the two names Jacob (the fleshly) and Israel (the spiritual.)

(b) Jacob's Bedside, 48:1-6

- Gen. 48:1 And it came to pass after these things, that *one* told Joseph, Behold, thy father *is* sick: and he took with him his two sons, Manasseh and Ephraim.
- 2 And one told Jacob, and said, Behold, thy son Joseph cometh unto thee: and Israel strengthened himself, and sat upon the bed.
- 3 And Jacob said unto Joseph, God Almighty appeared unto me at Luz in the land of Canaan, and blessed me,
- 4 And said unto me, Behold, I will make thee fruitful, and multiply thee, and I will make of thee a multitude of people; and will give this land to thy seed after thee *for* an everlasting possession.
- <u>5</u> And now thy two sons, Ephraim and Manasseh, which were born unto thee in the land of Egypt before I came unto thee into Egypt, are mine; as Reuben and Simeon, they shall be mine.
- <u>6</u> And thy issue, which thou begettest after them, shall be thine, and shall be called after the name of their brethren in their inheritance.

- When Jacob knew that Joseph and his boys were arriving, (48:2,)"...Israel strengthened himself, and sat upon the bed."
- The timing was of utmost importance for it concerned the structure and composition of the tribes for the future.
- ❖ Jacob reminisces about the past and his encounters with God Almighty El Shaddai (48:3-4.)



Gen. 35:6 So Jacob came to Luz, which is in the land of Canaan, that is, Bethel, he and all the people that were with him.

Moving from the past to the present, 48:5:

Gen. 48:5 And now thy two sons, Ephraim and Manasseh, which were born unto thee in the land of Egypt before I came unto thee into Egypt, are mine; as Reuben and Simeon, they shall be mine.

- ❖ Jacob officially adopted Ephraim and Manasseh as his own sons, giving Joseph two tribes within the 12 tribes of Israel, on equal standing with the other sons = a true double portion or blessing of the firstborn. (See Gen. 34:25, 35:22)
- 1 Chron. 5:1 Now the sons of Reuben the firstborn of Israel, (for he was the firstborn; but, forasmuch as he defiled his father's bed, his birthright was given unto the sons of Joseph the son of Israel: and the genealogy is not to be reckoned after the birthright.

 2 For Judah prevailed above his brethren, and of him came the chief ruler; but the birthright was Joseph's:)

<u>Josh. 14:4</u> For the children of Joseph were two tribes, Manasseh and Ephraim: therefore they gave no part unto the Levites in the land, save cities to dwell *in*, with their suburbs for their cattle and for their substance.

(c) Jacob's Bereavement, 48:7

Gen. 48:7 And as for me, when I came from Padan, Rachel died by me in the land of Canaan in the way, when yet there was but a little way to come unto Ephrath: and I buried her there in the way of Ephrath; the same is Bethlehem.

- ❖ Jacob's true love, Rachel, is evidently on his mind, after many years.
- A Rachel, as Joseph's mother, was honored by Jacob with the blessing on the grandsons.

(d) Jacob's Blindness, 48:8-12

- <u>Gen. 48:8</u> And Israel beheld Joseph's sons, and said, Who *are* these? <u>9</u> And Joseph said unto his father, They *are* my sons, whom God hath given me in this *place*. And he said, Bring them, I pray thee, unto me, and I will bless them.
- 10 Now the eyes of Israel were dim for age, so that he could not see. And he brought them near unto him; and he kissed them, and embraced them.
- 11 And Israel said unto Joseph, I had not thought to see thy face: and, lo, God hath shewed me also thy seed.
- 12 And Joseph brought them out from between his knees, and he bowed himself with his face to the earth.

Ephraim and Manasseh are now in their 20's.


Heb. 11:21 By faith Jacob, when he was a dying, blessed both the sons of Joseph; and worshipped, *leaning* upon the top of his staff.

(e) Jacob's Blessing, 48:13-16

Gen. 48:13 And Joseph took them both, Ephraim in his right hand toward Israel's left hand, and Manasseh in his left hand toward Israel's right hand, and brought them near unto him.

14 And Israel stretched out his right hand, and laid it upon Ephraim's head, who was the younger, and his left hand upon Manasseh's head, guiding his hands wittingly; for Manasseh was the firstborn.

15 And he blessed Joseph, and said, God, before whom my fathers Abraham and Isaac did walk, the God which fed me all my life long unto this day, 16 The Angel which redeemed me from all evil, bless the lads; and let my name be named on them, and the name of my fathers Abraham and Isaac; and let them grow into a multitude in the midst of the earth.



Jacob blesses Joseph and his sons, <u>48:15-16</u>, with the covenant promises to Abraham and Isaac, from a spiritual perspective (use of Israel) and not a natural one (Jacob.)

(f) Jacob's Behavior, 48:17-20

Gen. 48:17 And when Joseph saw that his father laid his right hand upon the head of Ephraim, it displeased him: and he held up his father's hand, to remove it from Ephraim's head unto Manasseh's head.

- 18 And Joseph said unto his father, Not so, my father: for this is the firstborn; put thy right hand upon his head.
- 19 And his father refused, and said, I know it, my son, I know it: he also shall become a people, and he also shall be great: but truly his younger brother shall be greater than he, and his seed shall become a multitude of nations.
- <u>20</u> And he blessed them that day, saying, In thee shall Israel bless, saying, God make thee as Ephraim and as Manasseh: and he set Ephraim before Manasseh.

Jacob purposely placed the greater blessing of the firstborn on the younger brother.

(g) Jacob's Belief, 48:21-22

Gen. 48:21 And Israel said unto Joseph, Behold, I die: but God shall be with you, and bring you again unto the land of your fathers.

<u>22</u> Moreover I have given to thee one portion above thy brethren, which I took out of the hand of the Amorite with my sword and with my bow.

The land that Jacob won in battle will contain an extra portion for Joseph through the tribes of his two sons.

<u>Summary</u>

- Jacob planned his burial details and chose Joseph to handle them.
- ❖ Jacob officially adopted Ephraim and Manasseh as his own sons, giving Joseph two tribes within the 12 tribes of Israel, on equal standing with the other sons = a true double portion or blessing of the firstborn. (Josh. 14:4)
- Jacob lived for seventeen years in Egypt but did not allow Egypt to change his lifestyle.

- Ephraim and Manasseh were born in Egypt, but Joseph led them to live like God's chosen people, and Jacob recognized their identification with the Israelites.
- When children are brought up in the nurture and admonition of the Lord, they live to honor God.

Eph. 6:4 And, ye fathers, provoke not your children to wrath: but bring them up in the nurture and admonition of the Lord.

Conclusion

1 Jn. 3:1 Behold, what manner of love the Father hath bestowed upon us, that we should be called the sons of God: therefore the world knoweth us not, because it knew him not.

Rom. 8:14 For as many as are led by the Spirit of God, they are the sons of God.

- 15 For ye have not received the spirit of bondage again to fear; but ye have received the Spirit of adoption, whereby we cry, Abba, Father.
- 16 The Spirit itself beareth witness with our spirit, that we are the children of God:
- 17 And if children, then heirs; heirs of God, and joint-heirs with Christ; if so be that we suffer with him, that we may be also glorified together.
