

GRACE SO AMAZING FOR ENCOURAGEMENT 1 Cor. 7:5-7

2 Cor. 7: 4 Great is my boldness of speech toward you, great is my glorying of you: I am filled with comfort, I am exceeding joyful in all our tribulation. 5 For, when we were come into Macedonia, our flesh had no rest, but we were troubled on every side; without were fightings, within were fears. 6 Nevertheless God, that comforteth those that are cast down, comforted us by the coming of Titus; 7 And not by his coming only, but by the consolation wherewith he was comforted in you, when he told us your earnest desire, your mourning, your fervent mind toward me; so that I rejoiced the more.

The life of the Apostle Paul after his conversion was one of many blessings and many battles. During his second missionary journey, the Lord led him to Macedonia (Acts 16:9) and the chief city, Philippi (Acts 16:11-12.) Soon after arriving in Philippi, Paul and Silas were beaten and thrown in jail. In this passage, the Holy Spirit moved the Apostle Paul to write to the church in Corinth to reveal the personal challenges that he faced and how he had encouragement in the midst of such a time of tribulation. We note how positive he is in verse four.

I. <u>PAUL DECLARED HIS COMFORT IN THE</u> TRIBULATION HE HAD, 7:4-5

A. His Personal Triumph, 7:4

2 Cor. 7:4 Great is my boldness of speech toward you, great is my glorying of you: I am filled with comfort, I am exceeding joyful in all our tribulation.

Paul expresses his confidence with words like "great" and "filled with comfort" and "I am exceeding joyful in all tribulation." Original Word: ὑπερπερισσεύω

Transliteration: huperperisseuó

Definition: to abound more exceedingly (only used

2x in NT – here and Rom. 5:20)

Usage: (a) intrans: I abound exceedingly, (b) dep: I overflow.

hyperperisseúō – properly, beyond what already exceeds," i.e. ultra (super) abounds.

Jn. 15:11 These things have I spoken unto you, that my joy might remain in you, and that your joy might be full.

<u>Jn. 16:24</u> Hitherto have ye asked nothing in my name: ask, and ye shall receive, that your joy may be full.

Rom. 5:20 Moreover the law entered, that the offence might abound. But where sin abounded, grace did much more abound:

- God's amazing grace can triumph over sins and over situations.
 - B. His Pressing Troubles, 7:5-6
- In verse 4, the Apostle Paul expresses so much joy, even in the midst of tribulation, but then begins to elaborate on just how intense the tribulation was.

- 1. The Fatigue, 7:5a "our flesh had no rest"
- Paul did not enjoy any "down time" of relaxation and rest.
 - 2. The Fretting, 7:5b "we were troubled on every side"
- Paul was under constant pressure, totally surrounded.

Original Word: θλίβω Transliteration: thlibó

Definition: to press, afflict

Usage: (a) I make narrow (strictly: by pressure); I press upon, (b) I persecute, press hard.

thlíbō – properly, rub together, constrict (compress), i.e. pressed together;

(figuratively) oppressively afflict (distress), i.e. like when circumstances "rub us the wrong way" that make us feel confined (hemmed in); restricted to a "narrow" place.

- 3. The Fightings, 7:5c "without were fightings"
- Paul faced outside conflicts and confrontations.

Original Word: μάχη **Transliteration:** maché **Definition:** a fight

Usage: (earlier: a battle, conflict, hence) in the sphere of words, etc: strife, contention, quarrel. https://biblehub.com/greek/3163.htm

Besides the obvious challenges from without, the Apostle Paul also carried the burdens of the ministry:

2 Cor. 11:28 Beside those things that are without, that which cometh upon me daily, the care of all the churches.

- 4. The Fears, 7:5d "within were fears."
- So often the Apostle Paul appears fearless and courageous in standing faithful for God.
- Paul confessed to the Corinthian church that he battled the fears within his soul.

Original Word: φόβος **Transliteration:** phobos

Definition: panic flight, fear, the causing of fear, terror

Usage: (a) fear, terror, alarm, (b) the object or cause of fear,

(c) reverence, respect.

phóbos (phóbos) meant withdrawal, fleeing because feeling inadequate (without sufficient resources, Abbott-Smith).

Fear (*phóbos*) is commonly used in Scripture – sometimes positively (in relation to God) but more often negatively of *withdrawing from* the Lord (His will).

[Fundamentally, phóbos ("fear") means withdraw (separate from), i.e. flee (remove oneself) and hence to avoid because of dread (fright).]

II. PAUL DECLARED HIS COMFORT IN THE TIDINGS HE HEARD, 7:6-7

- A. Paul Was Comforted by His Friends 2 Cor. 7:6 Nevertheless God, that comforteth those that are cast down, comforted us by the coming of Titus;
- God gets the credit for providing the comfort.
- The believers who are "cast down" are candidates for comforting, and most often it is by the countenance of a friend.

Prov. 27:17 Iron sharpeneth iron; so a man sharpeneth the countenance of his friend.

Original Word: παρακαλέω Transliteration: parakaleó Definition: to call to or for, to exhort, to encourage Usage: (a) I send for, summon, invite, (b) I beseech, entreat, beg, (c) I exhort, admonish, (d) I comfort, encourage, console.

parakaléō – properly, "make a call" from being "closeup and personal." parakaléō ("personally make a call") refers to believers offering up evidence that stands up in God's court.

To be "cast down" is to be very low in spirit – discouraged and defeated.

Original Word: ταπεινός Transliteration: tapeinos

Definition: low-lying, lowly, lowly in spirit

Usage: humble, lowly, in position or spirit (in a good sense).

tapeinós (an adjective) – properly, low; (figuratively) inner lowliness describing the person who depends on the Lord rather than self.

tapeinós ("lowly, humble") means being God-reliant rather than self-reliant – which ironically always exalts a person (brings them true worth, cf. 1 Pet 5:6).

<u>Jas. 4:6</u> But he giveth more grace. Wherefore he saith, God resisteth the proud, but giveth grace unto the humble.

1 Pet. 5:5 Likewise, ye younger, submit yourselves unto the elder. Yea, all of you be subject one to another, and be clothed with humility: for God resisteth the proud, and giveth grace to the humble.

B. Paul Was Comforted by their Fellowship –

<u>2 Cor. 7:7</u> And not by his coming only, but by the consolation wherewith he was comforted in you, when he told us your earnest desire, your mourning, your fervent mind toward me; so that I rejoiced the more.

Paul was comforted in hearing of the emotional intensity expressed for his welfare!

Original Word: ἐπιπόθησις

Transliteration: epipothésis

Definition: longing (only used 2x in NT)

Usage: eager longing (desire), strong affection.

epipóthēsis – earnest (yearning) affection.

2 Cor. 7:11 For behold this selfsame thing, that ye sorrowed after a godly sort, what carefulness it wrought in you, yea, what clearing of yourselves, yea, what indignation, yea, what fear, yea, what vehement desire, yea, what zeal, yea, what revenge! In all things ye have approved yourselves to be clear in this matter.

Original Word: ὀδυρμός **Transliteration:** odurmos **Definition:** lamentation; **Usage:** lamentation, wailing, mourning, sorrow. (only used 2x in NT)

odyrmós – loud, grievous lamentation, typically accompanied by physical manifestations (shedding tears, shaking the head, etc.).

Mt. 2:18 In Rama was there a voice heard, lamentation, and weeping, and great mourning, Rachel weeping *for* her children, and would not be comforted, because they are not.

<u>Summary</u>

- The Apostle Paul was confronted with great trials of tribulation but maintained his joy.
- The Apostle Paul candidly expressed his personal challenges during difficult times.
- God provides the comfort needed in the way that each believer needs it.
- True friends and their fellowship are great comforts to those who are cast down.
